A MYSTERIOUS CASE.

THE REPUBLICAN this morning contains an interesting dispatch concerning the disquietude amongst the Moqui Indians, in the northeastern portion of the Territory. This news, together with a grapevine telegram from Frog Tanks announcing the presence in that vicinity of a large and pestiferous body of mosquitos, and the sudden but mysterious departure of Rear-General Gill and his hat for the north, is creating a restless feeling amongst certain nervous persons. It was announced by the Tucson Star that the Rear-General was simply going on a duty which we are informed of cooling off—a duty which we are informed by those on the inside, the "ginneral" owes to himself and military circles. There is, however, a feeling in certain quarters that the Rear-General, who is known to be somewhat ambitious and to likewise possess considerable "nerve," really is endeavoring to mobilize the army of the Territory and possess himself of the gubernatorial stool. Especially is this uneasiness felt in the rural districts, and the repeated assertions on the part of retainers that the Rear-General was simply loaded with a bottle of centipede juice, a cane and a hat, does not entirely allay suspicion. The statement that the v. a. is on a visit to the Sheriff of Yavapai to hold a consultation on a matter concerning a little article published reflecting on Judge Wright, while the General was a journalist of mark—with the accent on the mark—and before he had achieved military glory on the field of Gall is likewise unconfirmed. While THE REPUBLICAN does not believe that Rear-General Mr. Gill would entertain the rash notion of concentrating military force of the Territory for the purpose of subverting the present excellent form of government, yet would it not be well for the City Council to take precautionary measures against a night attack? An investment of a few dollars in Lemps' Beer (bottled) or Pommerly Sec might avert a catastrophe and we think would be justified by the taxpayers.

THE editor of the Independence (Kas.) Star sued a delinquent subscriber for \$11. The delinquent claimed that he never subscribed for the paper and did not propose to pay. The judge instructed the jury that if the evidence disclosed the fact that the delinquent had taken the paper from the office, or caused it to be so taken, they should find for the plaintiff. It cost the man nearly a hundred dollars to settle what eleven dollars would have paid. It pays to be honest, even with the printer.
