IN DOUBT!

Only Meager Returns From the National Election.

New York is Again an Important Factor.

An Official Count May be Necessary to Decide It.

MANY REPUBLICAN GAINS.

Kansas Wheels Into Line for Republicans.

Other States Show Large Republican Gains and Even the Solid South May be Broken.

New York.

New York—The election in this state today is for the selection of thirty-six presidential electors, thirty-four members of congress, a judge of the court of appeals and a legislature that will appoint a United States senator to succeed Senator Hiscock. The weather is fine, and early dispatches from all parts of the state indicate that a remarkably heavy vote is being polled. At the headquarters of both parties it is stated that the vote cast in the early morning hours has been fully up to their expectations, and Republicans and Democrats alike express themselves as confident of victory.

New York—The Press says, 800 election districts in the city gave Cleveland 115,071, Harrison 62,131—170 districts out of 648 in King's county give Cleveland 24,037, Harrison 16,110.

18 districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Cleveland 1,669, Harrison 2,782. Same districts in 1888 gave Cleveland 1,812, Harrison 3,064.

New York—129 districts outside of New York City and Brooklyn give Cleveland 14,242, Harrison 18,437. Same precincts in 1888 gave Harrison 4,800 plurality.

New York—950 districts out of 1,137 in New York City give Cleveland 142,326, Harrison 79,598.

New York—1,020 election districts in this city give Cleveland 154,743, Harrison 88,811.

Brooklyn—440 districts out of 648 in this city give Cleveland 61,670, Harrison 47,107.

New York—357 districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Cleveland 40,111, Harrison 51,058, same in 1888 gave Cleveland 43,511, Harrison 54,288.

New York—467 districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Cleveland 81,894, Harrison 66,148. Same 1888 Cleveland 55,462, Harrison 71,003.

New York—At 9:30 Chairman Sheehan of the Democratic state committee, claims that Cleveland has carried New York by at least 30,000 majority.

Illinois.

Chicago—Illinois today chooses twenty-four presidential electors, twenty-two congressmen, a governor to succeed Fifer and a state legislature. The registration in this city was extraordinarily large and a correspondingly heavy vote is being polled. Judge Altgeld, the Democratic candidate for governor, has made an energetic fight, but the prospects are that Governor Fifer will be re-elected and that the state will be found in the Harrison column. The congressional delegation is likely to be given to a slight extent. Editor Owen Scott, who captured the fourth district Republican stronghold two years ago by some 1,200 plurality, is likely to retire to private life, while J. G. Cannon, who after many years of service in Washington was beaten by the hundred majority in the fifteenth district as a result of a split in the Republican camp thereabouts, will probably be restored to his former honor.

Chicago—143 out of 765 precincts in this city give Harrison 18,625, Cleveland 28,090.

Chicago—Six townships outside of Cook county give Harrison 9,073, Cleveland 6,983. Same in 1888 gave Harrison 4,842, Cleveland 7,344.

Chicago—215 townships outside of Cook county give Harrison 3,823, Cleveland 2,953. Same in 1888 gave Harrison 574 plurality.

Chicago—416 precincts in the city give Harrison 41,457, Cleveland 61,457.

New York—A Herald bulletin says the Chicago Tribune concedes Illinois to Cleveland.

Chicago—The Daily News, extra, claims Illinois for Cleveland by over 20,000.

Chicago—The probability is that Cleveland has carried Illinois and Altgeld, Democratic candidate for governor, elected by 12,000 to 15,000 majority. Chicago will give the Democratic ticket 30,000 majority and the balance of Cook county will reduce that to 25,000. Republican headquarters say they do not claim over 10,000 to 15,000 for Fifer outside of Cook county.

Chicago—649 out of 693 precincts in Chicago give Harrison 72,316, Cleveland 89,721.

Chicago—220 townships outside of Cook county give Harrison 41,259, Cleveland 35,839. Same in 1888 gave Harrison 38,748, Cleveland 31,805. Cleveland's net gain 1,523.

Chicago—292 towns outside of Cook county give Harrison 56,616, Cleveland 50,493.

Chicago—602 precincts give Harrison 69,365, Cleveland 99,689.

Pennsylvania.

Philadelphia—Thirty-two presidential electors, thirty members of congress, a legislature that will choose a successor to Senator Quay and a judge of the supreme court are to be selected today. The indications are that the state will give its usual presidential year majority. The voting in this city during the early morning hours was quite brisk, especially in the working class precincts. It is said that as a result of the recent troubles at Homestead many trades union men are voting the Democratic ticket.

Homestead—The election absorbed Homestead today to the exclusion of the strike and all other matters. The interest in voting is not so large as in former years, as many persons moved away. It was distinguished by a large amount of cutting of both the national and local nominees. The ticket was bolted by a large number of locked-out men and the Democratic leaders claim the borough, but the Republicans don't concede it.

Indiana.

Indianapolis—At the election in Indiana today, four parties—Republicans, Democrats, Populists and Prohibitionists—all had electoral and state tickets in the field. Two minor parties also had candidates for congress in the race for district and county tickets in nearly every county in the state. At the time the polls closed the indications pointed to the largest vote ever polled in the state.

Indianapolis—Not enough returns are in to indicate the result. The returns received show a small gain for Harrison.

Indianapolis—Twelve precincts in Indiana show a net Republican gain as compared with the vote of 1890.

Indianapolis—Sixteen precincts in Indiana give Harrison 1,571, Cleveland 1,304. Republican gain of 190.

Indiana—54 precincts give Harrison 5,566, Cleveland 4,939. Net Republican gain over 1890 of 411.

Indianapolis—Both parties claim Indiana.

Indianapolis—This county gives Cleveland 4,500 majority, a gain of 300 over 1888. Shelby county gives Cleveland 800, a gain of 268 over 1888.

Kansas.

Topeka—Kansas elects governor, state officials and eight representatives in congress. For governor A. Smith Rep. L. D. Llowling, Peoples Party, I. O. Pickering Pro. The Democrats and Peoples Party have fused on the electoral ticket.

Kansas City—The Times Topeka, Kan., bulletin says, Kansas gives a majority for Weaver electors but the Republicans have saved the state ticket.

Topeka—Partial returns from seven counties now represented by Jerry Simpson indicate that he is defeated.

Topeka—Republican central committee claims the state by 20,000 plurality. The chairman of the Peoples Party concedes nothing.

Nebraska.

Omaha—Nebraska elects governor and state officers, six representatives in congress and a legislature to choose a United States senator, vice Baddock. For governor Lorenzo Crouse Rep. J. S. Morton Dem.

The New York Times bulletin says Nebraska gives Weaver 1,000 plurality.

Omaha—A much heavier vote was cast in Nebraska than was anticipated by campaign managers of all parties. Fully three-quarters of the Democratic vote was thrown to Weaver electors to divert the vote from Harrison. Returns coming very slowly and it will be ten hours before the result can be known, but figures largely indicate success of Weaver electors.

Nevada.

Carson—Nevada elects supreme court judge, a representative in congress, and a legislature to choose a United States senator, vice Stewart. Indirectly for Senator Horace F. Bartine Rep., R. M. Clarke Dem., Wm. M. Stuart Silver.

Reo—It is conceded by all parties that Weaver carries Nevada by 1,500. Newlands, silver man, elected to congress. The result as to the legislature is not yet certain, but it is generally believed that the silver party have a majority, which will insure the election of Stewart to the United States senate.

North Carolina.

Raleigh—North Carolina elects governor and state officers and nine representatives in congress. For governor David M. Furche Rep. Elias Carr, D.

Raleigh—Returns come in very slowly. They show thus far People's Party vote drawn as much from Republicans as from Democrats. In 10 precincts taken at random in as many counties Cleveland gets 1,500, Harrison 1,000, Weaver 100.

Colorado.

Denver—Colorado votes today for Federal electors, a state ticket, two congressmen. The Fusion plan leaves the Republican electoral ticket opposed only by that of the Peoples Party and Prohibitionists. The candidates for governor are J. C. Helm Rep. Davis, H. Waite Peoples Party.

Massachusetts.

Boston—Massachusetts elects governor, state officers, thirteen representatives in congress and a legislature to choose a United States senator, vice Daves. For governor William E. Rus-

sell, Dem. William H. Halle, Rep. Henry Winn, Peoples Party.

North Dakota.

Fargo—North Dakota elects governor and state officers, a representative in congress and a legislature to choose a United States senator vice Casey. For governor Andrew H. Burke Rep. E. C. D. Shortbridge Dem.

Bismarck—The election today was on presidential electors between the Republicans and Peoples Party, the latter electors being endorsed by the Democrats. Cold weather did not keep voters at home, as the greatest interest was shown in the result.

Wisconsin.

Milwaukee—Wisconsin elects governor and state officers, ten representatives in congress and a legislature to choose a United States senator, vice Sawyer. For governor, John C. Spooner, Rep. Geo. W. Peck Dem.

Milwaukee—Very cool and so far as reported the vote cast is the fullest ever known.

Milwaukee—Seventeen voting precincts in the interior of the state show Harrison 1,225, Cleveland 2,437. This is a Democratic gain over 1888 of 265.

Montana.

Helena—Montana will today elect governor and state officers, a representative in congress and a legislature to choose a United States senator, vice Sanders, R. For governor, J. E. Richards, R.; T. E. Collins, D.

Helena—Republican headquarters gives the following: 29 precincts give Harrison 1,838, Cleveland 1,452.

Missouri.

St. Louis—The citizens of this state are today voting for electors for governor, Lieut. Gov., secretary of state and fifteen congressmen. The gubernatorial candidates are William Warner Rep. William J. Stone Dem. I. Sobeski Peoples Party, L. Leonard Peoples Party. For lieutenant governor Rudolph Mueller Rep. J. B. O'Mara Dem.

California.

San Francisco—This state votes for seven representatives today, a legislature to choose Senator Felton's successor and Federal electors.

Santa Barbara county Republican committee claims 150 plurality for Harrison. The Democratic committee says Cleveland will run about even. Democratic assemblymen elected and Cannon Democrat for congress.

New Jersey.

Trenton—Four candidates for governor are being voted for today and eight congressional candidates for each party. The candidates are Rep. John Keen Jr., Dem. George T. L. Werts, Peoples Party, B. J. Bird, Pro. T. J. Kennedy.

Trenton—Indications are that Cleveland has carried New Jersey by about 6,000.

Michigan.

Detroit—A governor, state officers, a legislature that will choose a United States senator, twelve members of congress and fourteen presidential electors are to be chosen in this state.

60 precincts in the western election district give Harrison 8,461, Cleveland 6,684, Weaver 823.

New Hampshire.

Concord—The interest in the election is the most intense of years, as New Hampshire is now regarded as a pivotal state. J. B. Smith, R. L. F. McKinney Dem., William O. Noyes Peoples Party, Edgar L. Carr Pro. are the gubernatorial candidates.

Tennessee.

Memphis—Tennessee elects governor and state officers, ten representatives in congress and a legislature to choose a United States senator, vice Bate. For governor, George W. Winstead Rep., Peter Turner Dem.

Wyoming.

Cheyenne—Wyoming elects governor and state officers, a representative in congress and a legislature to choose a United States senator vice Warren. For governor Edward Iverson Rep. John E. Osborne Dem.

Cheyenne—Estimates show Harrison electors elected by a small majority. The legislature doubtful.

Rhode Island.

Providence—McVillie Bull Rep. and O. Lapham Dem. are the congressional candidates in the first, and A. P. Chapman Rep. and C. H. Page Dem. the candidates in the second. All four parties have electoral tickets in the field.

Delaware.

New York—The Herald says, Delaware is probably Republican.

Iowa.

Des Moines—Iowa today votes for electors, for secretary of state and eleven congressmen.

Des Moines—No disturbance reported during the day, and the indications point to an unusually large vote.

Des Moines—105 precincts give Harrison 13,817, Cleveland 11,796, Weaver 840.

Virginia.

Richmond—Official and semi-official returns from 32 counties and cities including Petersburg, Norfolk and Lynchburg show Democratic gains of about 20,000.

South Dakota.

Yankton—South Dakota elects governor and state officers and two representatives in congress. For governor Charles L. Sheldon Rep. S. A. Ramsey Dem. M. M. Price Peoples Party.

Georgia.

Atlanta—Georgia elects eleven repre-

sentatives in congress. The Republicans will vote the Peoples Party electoral ticket.

West Virginia.

Wheeling—West Virginia elects governor and state officers, four representatives in congress to choose a United States senator vice Allen. For governor, John McGaw Rep. H. J. Snavely Dem.

Idaho.

Boise City—Idaho elects governor and state officers, a representative in congress and a legislature to choose a United States senator vice Shoup. For governor Wm. J. McConnell Rep. John M. Burke Dem.

Connecticut.

Hartford—It is claimed that Harrison has carried Connecticut.

Hartford—31 towns give Harrison 4,370, Cleveland 5,320. Democratic gain 211.

Hartford—53 towns in Connecticut give Cleveland 11,648, Harrison 11,192. Democratic gain of 983.

Vermont.

Returns from 50 towns give Harrison 12,765, Cleveland 5,606, Bidwell 443. Republican increase 1,954.

Ohio.

224 precincts outside of cities give Harrison a plurality of 4500. Same in 1891 gave McKinley a plurality of 2332.

Florida.

Jacksonville—The Republicans have no nominees in the field.

THE SENATE.

Prospects of Senators From Thirty-one States.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8.—[Associated Press.] On the result of the legislative elections in thirty-one states today depend the future prospects of as many members of the United States senate, eighteen of these are Republicans and thirteen are Democrats. The Republican senators whose successors are to be chosen by the legislatures elected today are Felton, Cal.; Hawley, Ct.; Perkins, Kans.; Hale, Me.; Dawes, Mass.; Davis, Minn.; Sanders, Mont.; Paddock, Neb.; Stewart, Nev.; Tuttle, N. H.; Hiscock, N. Y.; Casey, N. D.; Quay, Pa.; Aldrich, R. I.; Pettigrew, S. D.; Procter, Va.; Allen, Wash.; Sawyer, Wis.; Warren, Wyo.; and on the Democratic side, Gray, Del.; Pasco, Fla.; Turpie, Ind.; Gorman, Md.; Stockbridge, Mich.; George, Miss.; Cockrell, Mo.; Bloodgett, N. J.; Butler, S. C.; Bate, Tenn.; Mills, Tex.; Daniels, Va.; Faulkner, W. Va.

LIVED ON HUMAN BLOOD.

Murderer Record of a Deranged Portuguese Prisoner.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 8.—[Associated Press.] Deputy United States Marshal Williams of Cincinnati has removed James Brown, a deranged United States prisoner, from the Ohio penitentiary to the National asylum at Washington. The prisoner fought like a tiger against being removed.

Twenty-five years ago he was charged with being a vampire and living on human blood. He was a Portuguese sailor, and shipped on a fishing smack from Boston up the coast in 1867. During the trip two of the crew were missing, and an investigation was made.

Brown was found one day in the hold of the ship sucking the blood from the body of one of the sailors. The other body was found at the same place and had been served in a similar manner. Brown was returned to Boston and convicted of murder and sentenced to be hanged. President Johnson commuted the sentence to imprisonment for life.

After serving fifteen years in Massachusetts he was transferred to the Ohio prison. He has committed two murders since his confinement. When being taken from the prison he believed that he was on his way to execution and resisted accordingly.

THE NAVAJO TROUBLES.

The New Mexico Militia May Be Called Out.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Nov. 8.—[Associated Press.] There is considerable excitement in the city over the receipt of a telephone message to Captain W. B. Aennersheets of the local militia, to hold himself in readiness to move at a moment's notice for Manuelito, where several thousand Navajo Indians are congregated and threaten to do Agent D. L. Shipley bodily injury if he persists in collecting their children for school.

They state that they will not allow their offspring to attend the government schools and propose to carry out their ideas at the point of rifles. Should they do so, and will, if fired up by mean whisky, a general massacre of frontier settlers will be the result.

Fort Wingate is near by, but several companies of soldiers left the fort the other day to quiet the troubles now in progress in the Carrizo mountains and at Zuba City, and should the Indians at Manuelito create an uprising, the regular soldiers will have to have assistance from the territorial militia.

An order for a big lot of rifles and cartridges was received by several hardware stores this afternoon and the goods will be shipped to Manuelito tonight.

Big Mining Deal.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Nov. 8.—Messrs. J. P. and J. B. Morford, L. White and Louisa Irvine have sold to Eben Smith the Victor mine at Cripple Creek for \$65,000. The deed of transfer to Mr. Smith was filed with the county clerk today.

A Stage Held Up.

DOWNVILLE, Nov. 8.—The stage between here and Sierra City was held up last night by highwayman who secured the express box containing \$300.

W. G. STEWART.

His Triumphant Election Almost Assured.

The Result will Depend Upon the North.

Expected to Overcome Smith's Southern Vote.

The Returns Come in Slowly and the Final Result May not be Known for Several Days.

The returns from the territory came in slowly last night, and as will be seen below many of these were sent before the vote had been fully counted. The result is therefore uncertain, but it looks like a close contest between Stewart and Smith, while Cluff has probably defeated Norris. The territorial legislature is in doubt.

Gila County.

GLOBE, Ariz., Nov. 8.—A heavy vote was polled today in Gila county and the count seems to indicate a handsome majority for both Stewart and Cluff. The legislative ticket is in doubt, as the three parties claim the councilman. Griffiths, Republican, carried a heavy vote at Pioneer, but many of the outlying precincts have not yet reported.

Graham County.

SOLOMONVILLE, Ariz., Nov. 8.—[Special.] Smith's majority in Solomonville, San Jose Tafford, Thatcher and Pima, 321; Norris' majority 169. In same precincts Republicans probably elect councilman, one representative and sheriff. The vote at Clifton and Morenci will probably give a majority of 250 for Stewart.

Coconino County.

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Nov. 8.—[Special.] Stewart will carry Coconino county by a large majority. Cluff will make a stand-off. The count is now in progress.

Pima County.

TUCSON, Ariz., Nov. 8.—[Special.] A heavy vote was polled here today and the count is proceeding slowly. Stewart's majority will be 100 and may reach 200.

Yuma County.

YUMA, Ariz., Nov. 8.—[Special.] The result as to delegate to congress uncertain, Cluff will have forty majority. Republicans concede the election of the Democratic legislative ticket. The county ticket carried by the Republicans.

Yavapai County.

PRESOTT, Ariz., Nov. 8.—[Special.] The vote is now half counted. Stewart's majority in Yavapai county is estimated at 250.

STABBED AND SHOT HIS WIFE.

An Indiana Murderer Then Takes His Own Life.

LA PORTE, Ind., Nov. 8.—[Associated Press.] The dead body of the wife of Conrad Gaa was found on the banks of Clear lake, this city, this morning, and the dead body of her husband at the home of his parents, a mile distant, about the same time. Gaa had murdered his wife by stabbing her twice and shooting three times after enticing her to the lonely spot where she was found, and returning home, had committed suicide by taking rat poison. The couple quarreled often because of jealousy, and had been married several times, being divorced three times. Gaa's brother is now serving a life sentence for wife murder.

PLOTTED HIS MURDER.

Killing of Detective Carey May Reveal a Sensation.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—[Associated Press.] The killing of Central Office Detective John J. Carey by the crook, James D. Blanchett, bids fair to reveal a sensation. Detectives today received information that there was a conspiracy to assassinate Carey, and that Blanchett and another member of the gang were told off to do it. Acting on this information which they received, Detectives tonight went to 24 West Fortieth street, to a flat said to be occupied by a woman named Edwards, which they broke into. Ten professional thieves were found there and placed under arrest. They are said to have been concerned in the plot to murder Carey.

Bold Bank Robbers in Kansas.

SPARVILLE, Kan., Nov. 8.—About 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon two men entered the Ford county bank at this place and with drawn revolvers robbed Cashier Baird of \$1,700. In their haste the robbers overlooked another large sum in the vault. A confederate held the horses while the two robbers entered the bank. As the robbers ran out of the bank and jumped into their saddles a party of hunters came along and opened fire on them. The robbers returned the fire. About fifteen shots were exchanged but no one was hurt on either side. The robbers rode south, but were over-

taken by a posse who had started in pursuit. Another running battle ensued in which many shots were exchanged, but the robbers managed to escape. It is not known whether any of them were wounded or not. A reward of \$480 has been offered for the capture of the men.

The Preservation of Game.

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 8.—A memorial has been sent to President Harrison and Secretary Noble, recommending that measures be taken by the National and state governments for the preservation of game in the White River Plateau reservation, by preventing the reckless slaughter by hunters and Indians and by an addition to the reservation so as to provide a proper and natural winter range for the game which migrates between the higher and lower altitudes. The document bears the signature of every resident in the park.

Trouble at the Polls.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—Dick Creighton, an ex-senator who served a term of imprisonment, was arrested this afternoon by a police officer on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. He has been engaged in political work about the polls in the twenty-ninth district and indulged in an altercation with a voter which led to his drawing a pistol. He was suppressed before any shooting was done.

Another Centenarian Gone.

St. Joseph, Mich., Nov. 8.—Miss Parmelia Wright died in Benton Harbor last night, aged 102 years. She was the oldest person in Benton county, having lived there 23 years. She retained her mental faculties to the last. Miss Wright was born near Fairfax court house, Virginia, and often met General George Washington, Thomas Jefferson and other noted men of that time.

CARSON ON TRIAL.

The Son of the Famous Scout on Trial for His Life.

LAR ANIMAS, Colo., Nov. 8.—[Associated Press.] Kit Carson, Jr., was put on trial here today. He is a son of the famous scout and looks a Carson. The crime with which he is charged is the murder of his mother-in-law, Mrs. William Richards, wife of old Billy Richards of Nine Mile. He is also charged with an assault with intent to commit murder on his father-in-law. It was the 10th of December, about a year ago, that Nine Mile bottom was thrown into a fever of excitement by the commission of what is believed to be one of the most bloody crimes ever committed in that section. In the afternoon of that day young Kit Carson came to the house of old Billy Richards, and soon after Mrs. Richards lay dead with a bullet in the back of her head, and Richards was prostrated with a bullet through his hips, and young Carson was a fugitive from justice. Out of thirty-nine men so far called and examined but three have been accepted. It is thought the jury will be secured about tomorrow night. There is but little doubt but that a jury can be found in the county.

A FREE FIGHT.

A Conflict Between U. S. Marshals and Police.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—[Associated Press.] A quarrel broke out at the seventh ward polling place here between the city police and United States marshals. It resulted first in a free fight and then in the arrest of the marshals, some four or five in all. They were taken before the recorder and admitted to bail.

The marshals then went before United States Commissioner Hunter and swore out warrants for the arrest of the police. Three of them were brought before the commissioner who held them to await the action of the United States grand jury.

In the scrimmage, the chief of the police drew a revolver on a marshal and threatened to shoot unless he surrendered. Edward Osborne, a senator, had to swear in his vote and a warrant for his arrest was immediately afterwards procured.

DIED IN ARIZONA.

Charles J. Eldridge Meets Death in the South.

LEADVILLE, Colo., Nov. 8.—[Associated Press.] Word was received in this city today of the death of Charles Eldridge, who died in Arizona while on his way to New Mexico. Eldridge was a resident of the Carbonate camp for the past fourteen years, and was known as one of the best mining experts in Colorado. While looking after some property in Pitkin county last winter, he contracted a cold which settled upon his lungs, which was the cause of his death. In his early days a member of the Chinese arms and navy and was in command of a junk.
