NEWS OF THE TOWN

PHOENIX WEATHER.

USSEY TO RETURN.—Sheriff Munds of Yavapai county arrived in Phoenix last night for the purpose of returning the notorious King Ussey to Prescott for trial.

BUCKEYE STAGE.—W. H. Bynum, well known in Phoenix, has secured the contract for carrying the mail between this city and Buckeye three times per week, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

BIG ATTENDANCE.—The attendance at the various Sunday schools is booming upward. The Presbyterian Sunday school reported an attendance yesterday morning of 291, including officers and teachers.

WORTHY OF ADMIRATION.—The large, handsome roses that are yet untouched by frost and which are growing outdoors in Phoenix and vicinity are well worthy of the admiration that the public is bestowing upon them.

CAME TOO LATE.—A young gentleman by the name of Beach arrived here about two weeks ago from Virginia suffering from lung trouble. He died last evening at his rooms on South Third avenue. The remains will be sent east for interment.

FIRST IN THE AFTERNOON.—The band concert was held at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon and was attended by a large throng of people, both afoot and in vehicles. The evenings have become too chilly for band concerts and the session in the afternoon yesterday was the first of the fall season.

PLAS PNEUMONIA.—Dr. Dameron is reported quite ill with a severe attack of pneumonia and his condition is giving his friends considerable uneasiness. He was taken sick with a chill Friday night and his condition rapidly became worse. Although no fatal results are apprehended, the doctor is a very sick man.

HERE ONLY TEN DAYS.—The body of Morgan E. Craft, thirty years old, was shipped Saturday night to his old home in New York city. The remains were accompanied by the father and mother of the deceased, who were at his bedside when he died. Mr. Craft had been in the city only ten days, coming here for the benefit of his health.

STARTED A LODGE.—Damon Lodge No. 19, Knights of Pythias, was instituted at Mesa City Saturday night. Forty-one members from Phoenix attended and did the work practically an all-night affair. The Phoenix people not arriving home in their special train until 5 o'clock Sunday morning. They initiated thirty-five candidates, leaving sixteen more for the new lodge to get in its work on Monday.

BOTH TRAINS LATE.—Both the Maricopa and Santa Fe trains were late in arriving yesterday. On the main line of the Santa Fe, heavy traffic was responsible for a delay of three hours Saturday at Ash Fork. Then, to cap the climax, the axle of the engine on the S. F. P. & P. railroad was fractured. The train did not arrive, in consequence, until 5 o'clock Sunday morning. The train from Maricopa did not arrive until noon yesterday on account of a delay on the main line.

A BIG TURN OUT.—Moss Drachman returned yesterday from Tucson and other points in southeastern Arizona, where he has been engaged in practically all the afternoon sessions. He interviewed a number of the most prominent people on the same subject and was given assurances that a large delegation from there will attend. Tucson people especially will be here in large numbers, he says, and the interest being taken in the carnival is especially encouraging because people generally regard it as a territorial matter and as a subject of territorial pride.

ITS THIRD ANNIVERSARY.—The third anniversary of the establishment of the Crittenton home in this city will be observed on Tuesday with appropriate exercises, consisting of devotional exercises from 2 to 3 o'clock in the afternoon and a programme of music and addresses by the various pastors of the city in the evening. At the conclusion of the afternoon session refreshments will be served. The date of the anniversary is also sought to be made by the friends of the home a day of donations. Gifts of money, dry goods, groceries, hay, grain and, in fact, articles of utility and value in general will be thankfully received.

SUFFRAGE CONVENTION TODAY.—A territorial woman's suffrage convention meets today in the Patton Grand opera house. Miss Mary G. Hay, a representative of the national suffrage association, who will be remembered as a worker in the legislature last winter when the woman suffrage bill was pending, will be present and will preside over the sessions. Delegates will be present from several points in the territory. A business session will be held this afternoon at

In the evening at 8 o'clock Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, who addressed the legislature last winter, will speak upon the subject, "A Prophecy." The public are cordially invited to attend. The lecture is free, but a collection will be taken to defray the expenses of the convention. Sessions will also be held at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning and 2:30 Tuesday afternoon.

EVERYBODY IS COMING.—Prof. J. R. Meskimmund returned yesterday from a tour through northwestern Arizona and southern California, advertising the carnival. The fame of the proposed event, he found, had preceded him and the advertising matter was eagerly sought after. Everybody, he says, thinks the carnival envelopes "are just the thing." "The number of people he met who said they are coming to Phoenix during the carnival was most surprising. 'I have always wanted to make the trip,' said many of his chance acquaintances, 'and I believe I'll go over to see the carnival.' These people, in Prof. Meskimmund's estimation, will crowd the trains to overflowing and contribute toward making the carnival the greatest event of the kind in the history of the territory.

SOCIETIES RESPONDING.—The hearts of the officers of the carnival association have been made glad by the heartiness with which the secret societies have responded to the invitation to participate in the grand parade on Monday morning, December 4. The Odd Fellows have decided upon appearing in the line of march in their regalia and have extended invitations to the lodges at Mesa City, Tempe and Glendale to participate with them. It is confidently expected that over 200 members of the various Odd Fellows lodges will be in the line of march, making in themselves a most imposing array. At a meeting of the Sisters of Rebekah, held yesterday afternoon, it was decided that if the financial part can be arranged the members of the lodge will fit up three floats for the parade, emblematic of the order.

ACROSS THE DESERT.—Members of El Zaribah Temple Nobles of the Mystic Shrine have been unusually active for a few days and evidence accumulates that some time this afternoon there will be a big public parade when all the noxious who have been selected as in prime condition for the slaughter, will be led, hanging onto the rope, through the streets of this oasis in the desert like sheep before their shepherds. There is to be a ceremonial session tonight the mystic proceedings of which can only be conjectured by those who have not been plain. Those who have, are beyond hope, fear, or any other old thing. It is supposed they will follow this up by a banquet, as it is a well established fact that the Shriners, above all others, live by eating and drinking. So if the tom tom reverberates this p. m. and howlers heard this a. m. it need not be taken for the opening of the carnival. It will only be the innocent number of a few luckless Masons.

THE FIRST THIRTY DAYS.—I have noticed during my residence in Phoenix," said a gentleman yesterday, "that a great many invalids die within thirty days after arriving here. They are usually in a desperate physical condition and do not have the strength to become acclimated. The invalid who can stand the first month or two of change and gets settled down into a regular routine will commence to gather strength and if there is any chance at all he will recover.
