NEW EXPLANATION OF SMELL.

The ordinary explanation of the phenomena of odors and of smells is precisely that adopted by the ancient Greek philosophers. They held that small particles of the odoriferous body were detached and transmitted by the air to the mucous membrane of the nose. The actual contact of these minute particles with the nasal membrane produced the sensations of smell. A similar view was held by the ancients, and even by Sir Isaac Newton, as to the explanation of the phenomena of sight. Corpuscles were supposed to be darted out in every direction by a luminous body and to fall on the retina of the eye. By this contact, the phenomena of vision is produced. The theory of emission of light has since the time of Huyghens been replaced by the undulatory theory of vision. Molecular motions in the luminous body set up movements in the surrounding ether—light waves. These waves travel through the ether and enter the eye and there set up corresponding movements of the elements of the retina, and these movements are the cause, and the only cause, of the phenomena of seeing. The brain interprets the sensation by the light of experience. MM. Vaschide and Van Melie have lately proposed an undulatory theory of smell to replace the emissive theory, and have enforced it by reasons too special to be recited here. They declare that smell does not arise from a direct contact between particles emitted from an odoriferous body and the ends of the olfactory nerves, but that the odoriferous body sends out a set of radiations analogous to light waves, X-rays, etc.—analogous but not similar. The arguments of the authors of the new hypothesis are ingenious, but their theory is convincing as yet. Their theory deserves and will receive a thorough investigation. In the meantime we may consider the question as an open one. Certain it is that the commonly received theory leaves many things unexplained.

EGGS TO BE CHEAPER.

After having reached zero weather prices, notwithstanding the thermometer has been well in the 50s, eggs are now on the decline. The fear of a famine has passed, for receipts began increasing three days ago, and advices from the shippers are that the supply from now on will be constant. This relates only to fresh eggs. Storage eggs are normal and there are trainloads of them in the west bottoms. Fresh eggs, which are now so scarce, are almost all taken by hotels and restaurants. The corner groceryman has to content himself with storage eggs, although the high-class stores are paying the price and picking up odd cases. Hotels and caterers cannot use storage eggs, because they ruin the delicate pastry and raise the criticism of the patrons of their establishment who are generally ready to protest.

Artemus Ward observed that it was exasperating to think that the hens quit laying right when eggs were at their highest value. Lee Bower, the egg man on the market square, says they quit laying at most inopportune times, and after having handled millions of eggs in the many years he has been in the commission business here Mr. Bower is obliged to confess that there was no earthly use of their quitting a month ago. "The weather was nice, there were the usual number of hens in the country, but the pesky things just naturally quit laying and eggs went up," he says. They went to 25 cents a dozen, but yesterday were weak at 21 cents wholesale. Eighteen cents is predicted for next week, not because of the good will of the hens, but according to Mr. Bower, "because the young pullets have started laying. During the fall pullets are too young to lay and the hens moult. While they are moulting and from four to six weeks afterwards, they lay no eggs. This year they carried this high-handed work on much longer than usual, and too add to the distress of the times Kansas City howled for eggs. I never sold so many eggs as I have this fall. The increased demand is most material. Twenty-five cents is all right for January, but all wrong for Thanksgiving.

yet they brought 25 cents on Thanksgiving and the weather was as nice as a hen could want."

It is possible that one reason for the scarcity of eggs is the fact that Armour Swift and Schwarzhild are heavy buyers. They have gone into the fresh egg business with a vengeance, and the eggs they sell to New Yorkers are scarcely two days older than those sold here. The egg laid in western Kansas is on the table at the Waldorf hotel almost before it is cold. "I remember the time that it took four days to haul our fresh eggs to Kansas City," said a commission merchant yesterday, "but now they get these Kansas eggs 2000 miles away and cooked before that time passes."

If Kansas City is not the heaviest egg and poultry market in the country then it is the second, so they say among the commission men. This is all because the meat packers have gone into the business. The market here is always within one-half cent of Chicago. Poultry is much cheaper than meat today as a result of packers bringing so much of it to market. Butchers are able to buy good turkeys at 8 1/2 cents, which is considerably less than they can get choice beef for, and every cut of turkey is choice.—Kansas City Journal.
