ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE PACIFIC MATCH COMPANY. Know all men by these presents, that we, Thomas P. Cosgrave, Charles M. Petty, W. S. Conner, W. A. Moore, J. W. Bearup, F. W. Mugler, Robert L. Hargrove, J. A. Dyer, John R. Richardson, J. G. Roberts and Harry Plate, have this day voluntarily associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the Territory of Arizona, and we certify:

That the principal place in the Territory of Arizona for transacting business of said corporation, shall be and is the city of Phoenix, county of Maricopa, Territory of Arizona.

That the principal place of the manufacture and sale of matches of said corporation, outside of the Territory of Arizona, and the location of the works of said corporation, shall be in the county of Madera, state of California.

That the place, outside the said Territory of Arizona, of transacting business of said corporation, shall be and is, the town of Madera, county of Madera, state of California.

That the purposes for which said corporation is formed and the general nature of the business proposed to be transacted by said corporation is, and are as follows, to-wit:

The purchase, manufacture and sale of all kinds of matches; the purchase, leasing and sale of all kinds of lumber, materials and merchandise; the splitting, sawing, planing, lipping and manufacturing of all kinds of matches; the operation, building, leasing, hiring, purchasing and selling of buildings, machinery, chemicals, prescriptions, compositions, materials, goods, chattels, water, water rights, and all kinds of real and personal property, and borrowing and loaning and investing money; the general operation of a match factory and plant, and to subscribe for, own, hold, purchase, hypothecate, pledge, mortgage and sell bonds, notes, evidences of debt, stock, shares of stock of other corporations, real and personal property of every kind, and in general to do and perform any and all other acts and things necessary, advisable or proper for the effecting of the above purposes or for the carrying out the general nature of all business proposed to be transacted by this corporation; to create, operate and maintain agencies in all the states of the United States and foreign countries, and to transact all the business and things above named in all the states of the United States and all foreign countries.

That the amount of capital stock of said corporation, and the amount of capital stock authorized, is one hundred thousand (100,000) shares of the par value of one dollar (\$1.00) per share.

That said corporation shall commence to exist on the fifteenth day of May, 1901, and shall terminate on the fifteenth day of May, 1926.

That the officers and persons by whom the affairs of said corporation are to be conducted are as follows, to-wit:

Said corporation shall have eleven (11) directors. Said eleven (11) directors shall elect among their number the following officers of said corporation, to-wit: A president, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer, and may appoint such other officers as they may choose and determine.

The times at which said officers or persons by whom the affairs of this corporation are to be conducted, shall be elected, are as follows, to-wit: There shall be a regular annual meeting of the stockholders of this corporation on the second Tuesday of May of each year from and after the first Tuesday in May, 1901, which shall be the day of the first stockholders' meeting, at which meetings of stockholders, or if directors be not elected at such meetings, then at any meeting to which the same may be adjourned, the directors of said corporation shall be elected for the ensuing year. The meetings of the stockholders shall be in the said town of Madera, until otherwise determined or changed by said stockholders. In case of vacancy the remaining directors may fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

There shall be a regular annual meeting of the stockholders of this corporation on the second Tuesday of May of each year from and after the first Tuesday in May, 1901, which shall be the day of the first stockholders' meeting, at which meetings of stockholders, or if directors be not elected at such meetings, then at any meeting to which the same may be adjourned, the directors of said corporation shall be elected for the ensuing year. If the second Tuesday in May in any year falls on a holiday, such meeting shall be held on the succeeding day.
