THE CANAL BILL WILL BE PASSED

So Thinks Senator Baker of Kansas in an Interview.

Topoka, Kan., June 23.—Senator Harris, who is here to attend the state populist convention, thinks the canal bill will be passed by congress at the present session.

He talked with the president a short time ago. Said Senator Harris, "And I know from what he said that he favored a canal. Many of us in the senate do not favor the Panama proposition, but we decided that was the only way to get the canal during the present session and so agreed to it finally. I think the house will agree to the senate substitute. Congress probably will not adjourn for some time yet on account of the canal legislation."

SENTENCE COMMUTED.

Of I. L. Qualey, Convicted of Falsifying Mining Books. Acting Governor Stoddard yesterday commuted the sentence of I. L. Qualey, who had been convicted in the district court of Graham county of falsifying the books of a mining company in that county of which he was the general manager, the stockholders being mostly residents of the east. He was sentenced to six months in the county jail at Solomonville and to pay a fine of two hundred dollars.

GRAIN AND PROVISIONS.

Chicago, June 23.—The bears were active in a trap today and were squeezed to the good profit of the bulls. On a flake weather market the bears were induced to sell until the market was overbought. Early weakness, however, especially in wheat, was dispelled before the very bullish argument of greatly decreased stocks, and everything on the board rallied and advanced with a rush. At the close July wheat was 3/4 higher, July corn 1/8 higher and July oats 1/4 higher.
