

THE PRESIDENT WAS INVITED

Gov. Brodie's Urgent Requests Begun Three Months Ago.

It was stated in a special telegram from Washington to The Republican yesterday morning that the president would not visit any part of Arizona except the Grand Canyon and it was added that a strenuous effort had been made for the visit of the president to any Arizona town. It is probable that the correspondent of The Republican meant that the government of no town had extended an official invitation to the president but that no effort had been made by any Arizonian to have the president visit on the president's western itinerary.

Three months ago when the western journey first began to be talked of Governor Brodie made a request both as the personal friend of the president as well as the chief executive of the territory that President Roosevelt stop here on his way west and remain within the territory as long as possible. The request was renewed a month later. Both invitations were acknowledged by the then Secretary Cortelyou.

Yesterday the governor received a telegram from Secretary Loeb saying that the president would be in the territory on May 6 and the governor was requested to arrange for a horseback ride to the canyon.

Governor Brodie replied to the telegram and in the course of his reply again urged that the president give as much as possible of his time to this territory. He suggested that after the visit to the canyon the presidential party visit Prescott and after that Phoenix and Tucson and then proceed to California by the southern route. The president will be at the canyon from 9 o'clock in the morning until 6 in the evening. His party will comprise several of his personal friends, Dr. P. M. Rixey, representatives of the associated press, the Scripps service, the New York Sun service, Leslie's and Collier's weeklies, the Western Union and the Postal Telegraph companies and three special correspondents.

Governor Brodie is hopeful, since the itinerary has not been finally arranged that his suggestion regarding the trip through Arizona will be accepted.
