ALL KINDS OF GOLD

Caught By a New Placer Machine at Dos Cabezas.

Dr. J. Byron Sloane, president of the Dos Cabezas Gold Mining company and shareholder in the Nebraska Gold Mining company, informs a Range News representative that the new placer machine recently installed in Gold Gulch was started Wednesday morning and several tons of placer dirt put through with good results. The rate the machine treated the dirt on her trial run was about equal to 100 tons per day. To test the machine the surface dirt was run through and quantities of flower gold extracted.

Here is where this particular machine out does any other placer machine ever put into operation—it saves the fine or flower gold which is ordinarily lost in working placer dirt.

The machine catches on the riffles in the sluice way all the gold that has been able to catch in placer dirt, and every particle of fine or flower gold

which has always been lost by other methods of mining, is taken up and saved by this machine.

Being only the surface dirt which was run through on the start not much gold was expected as everyone thought the operators would have to dig down to richer dirt, but gold could plainly be seen to be gathering on the rollers before the machine had been running ten minutes. This surface or poor dirt was a severe test, as it has never been known to be handled by placer machines, when it could be gotten out of the way. This surface dirt will yield from \$1 to \$10 per ton in flower gold, when in the ordinary placer mining no trace would be found. This will give one some idea of the bonanza the operators have cornered.

Mr. Fred J. Hoyt, the inventor and patentee of the machine, was on the ground and was highly elated over the results obtained. He has had other machines working on other placer ground of gravel formation and their success was the same as this one has proved itself in treating the clay, adobe and gravel formation, which is to be found in Gold Gulch where the present machine is located.

Dr. Sloane will leave the fore part of next week for his home in Detroit, Mich., where he will remain for the purpose of this machine to the stockholders of the Dos Cabezas Gold Mining company and the Nebraska Gold Mining company. The former owns the ground and the latter the machine.

It is the intention of this company to operate machines in other placer dirt wherever it can be obtained.

**MOHAVE COUNTY MINES**

**New Deals and New Finds, With Flattering Future Prospects.**

Rumor has it this week that the Pilgrim group of mines owned by Dempsey & O'Dea, has been sold for an immense figure.

Operations have been suspended at the El Dorado Canyon mines for the summer and will not resume until the middle of September, on account of the extreme heat down there.

John Kay and Wife, of Mineral Park, are said to be taking out fine native copper ore from some of their mines at the Park, and expect to make a shipment soon.

Frank Hunt, who went to Gold Road last week, writes a friend here that he has succeeded in bonding a mine owned by himself and others in that rich district to some San Francisco parties for \$5,000.

McGraw and partner have taken on a lease on the Argo mine on Sherum's peak, owned by Thos. McNeely, and have a couple of men at work.

Louis Cuzino of the Park, was in town Thursday. He informs us that he has discovered very rich ore in his Mexican mine in Arizona Basin, and he is about to form a corporation with Los Angeles people to work the property.

There is a rumor that the Minnesota-Conner will resume operations in a short time. This property is too valuable to let go for any length of time, and when it resumes work, it will be something doing according to all reports.

A. M. MacDuffee has been out towards El Dorado Canyon a couple of times during the past ten days making examination of some mineral ledges, and taking samples. He made about forty assays the other day, but we did not learn results.

F. W. Theis has made an important strike in the Silver Age, located near the Minnesota-Conner. The ore streak is large, running over 200 ounces in silver to the ton, and is estimated to be worth \$3,000 a carload, and the lucky owner will make a nice little pile out of the new ore body he has opened up. Mr. Theis is a worker and deserves his good fortune.

L. Hoffman, president and manager of the Chloride Gold Mining company, operating the Samon and 4th of March mines at this place, has purchased a pack train of burros and in future the ore shipments, which amount to over a carload a month, will be packed directly from the mine to the depot instead of to the handling from where they were formerly being moved to the depot in wagons. Mr. Hoffman is building a corral at the depot, where the pack train will be kept. He is also erecting a platform the height of the car floors in order that the burros may be unloaded directly into the cars, thus greatly reducing the labor of handling the ore.—Chloride Arrow.

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**190,000 ACRES SIGNED**

**Board of Governors Gives Four Days of Grace.**

Yesterday was the banner day in point of acreage signed to the articles of incorporation of the Water Users' association, the total for the day being \$900 acres and the grand total now being approximately 190,000 acres. Dr. A. J. Chandler on Saturday signed a tract of nearly 10,000 acres, which has not been considered in the daily estimates, as it has been in process a long time and its reception in one large block having been previously assured. Counting that in Saturday would be the big day, but it might have been applied to any day during the last month so far as the intention of signing it is to be considered. With this tract the total for Saturday and Monday was about 23,000 acres.

This far about 2,000 acres under the Tempe canal has been signed in the office of the Water Users' association, and it is known that the solicitors on the south side and the Tempe banks were also receiving many contracts yesterday, though no reports had been made here last night. The boards of governors held their regular Monday meeting yesterday at which careful consideration was given the situation existing in Tempe. The board was fully informed as to Saturday's meeting, and while it deplored the fact that no decided action was taken on Saturday it felt that it would have been a charitable spirit to adhere rigidly to their announced intention of closing the books last night. It was clear to all that many were looking at the association in a new light since Mr. Davis' visit there and many are honestly considering the advisability of signing up who previous to Saturday had fully decided not to do so. Still they were unable to all of them sign up yesterday even had they been so inclined, and the board took the ground that one more demonstration of its magnanimity could work no injustice on those who were ready signed and would proceed absolutely that it had no desire to shut Tempe out of the association even though there is now more land signed than the government can accept. A resolution was therefore passed that the books be kept open till 6 o'clock Friday night, and it is expected that a number of non-residents and those who are sojourning away from home, providing that all contracts received by mail bearing evidence of having been completed and mailed by Friday night would be received and entered up on their arrival.

Many such contracts were received yesterday and probably will be every day this week. It is estimated that there are about 10,000 acres yet in small tracts throughout the valley that ought to be signed, and it is expected that if the Tempe people do as was indicated by several of them yesterday, about 10,000 acres more will be received from under that canal system. That will bring the total area by Friday night up to 210,000 acres and possibly to 215,000 acres.

It should be borne in mind that these resolutions of the board have been passed entirely for the benefit of those who should have signed before and only for the reason that it is the furthest from the association's intention to withhold from any man in this valley anything that can work for his happiness and prosperity hereafter. And another and an important point is that this is absolutely final. There can be no further postponement even if some might desire it, and for this reason. The board of governors will not meet again till next Monday, and before that time the legal time will have expired. There can be no further dallying with the powers that be, for even they have exhausted all their resources, have removed every obstacle, and still invite people to come in with lands that so far as the association is concerned cannot help its work along a particle. It is borne constantly in mind that the work is a public one and it is the people who should have all the possible benefits. To the secretary of the interior and his advisers will fall the unpleasant and arduous duty of trimming down the over-subscribed area to the irrigating capacity of the reservoir. There is a general feeling that old lands are to be chosen first if possible, and it is expected that some of the latest to sign will fare better in the trimming process than some who have long ago given their acreage to the association. The only possible benefit that can now accrue to the association from increased area is the fact that through it some of the

bars places in districts already generally signed may be wiped out.

Among those who signed here yesterday was Henry Slosser, one of the generals of the old-line opposition and now a light-hearted convert to the new order of things.

Mr. Arthur P. Davis addressed the board of governors yesterday at some length, defining what he believes the government's policy will be in the allotment of shares. He left on last night's M. & P. train for Globe, and will go from there to the reservoir basin. The work there will probably demand the most of his attention from now till the Tonto dam is either built or the project abandoned.

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
