NICK STARK

Winning Reward for Heroic Deeds in Arizona. C. Nick Stark has been heard from, whereas a great many Arizonians will rejoice. He was quite well known during a brief career in this territory and was for a time connected with the Republican and was later with the Williams News.

Following is a story of his tragic life published in the theatrical page of the Buffalo, (N. Y.) Courier along with a two-column picture of him which might serve the purposes of Willie Hearst if he happens to have no cut of his own. Those who are acquainted with the facts of Mr. Stark's life in Arizona will fear that he has forgotten some things and remembered others that neglected to happen.

"C. Nick Stark the publicity promoter and utility actor of the Academy Stock Company, has had a picturesque and varied career. Born upon his father's schooner during a terrific gale on Lake Erie, Stark seemed fated for a stormy existence; and his life voyage has so far been streaked with adventure and experiences that do not fall to the lot of the average stay-at-home person.

"Stark had previously had considerable stage experience, and concluding that anyone with hardihood enough to edit a newspaper in the uninviting Arizona field, ought to be able to cope successfully with the most unfriendly audiences. After the war he decided to adopt the theatrical calling permanently.

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C. Nick is a Detroit boy of whom several have been here within the last few years. A couple of them who are now in Detroit the other day had the pleasure of meeting him. One of them writing to a friend said: "I happened to be down on the pier the other night and met your old friend C. Nick Stark formerly of the wild of Arizona. He seems to be the real 'fertilizer.' Nick is a real live actor and was deeply insulted when Wiggins asked him what medicine show he was with. It appears that when he was in Arizona he was the deadly foe of all hostile Indians and held-up men.
