tion to instructions from any source. The only fight will be on the recommendation of a national committeeman but the delegates believe that will be arranged by a compromise so that none of the candidates heretofore mentioned will get it. The leading candidates, that is those most actively engaged in the struggle are Thomas E. Farish and Eugene Frady O'Neill. The claim of each of them is based upon his activity in favor of Hearst. Mr. Farish is supposed to be the original Hearst man of Arizona, but Mr. O'Neill has been looked upon as the representative in the territory of the Hearst interests. He is regarded as the man who swung the south for Hearst when it seemed a foregone conclusion that it would be sold against instructions, and it is said that while he was framing up the southern delegations he took pains to see that they would not be unfriendly to his own ambitions.

His friends do not believe that the charge that he assisted the republicans of Phoenix two years ago, and acted as a challenger at the First ward polls will cut any figure. They point out that political lines were not drawn in that struggle anyhow; that the main issue was a municipal water system and that a good many democrats of the First ward voted for the republican candidate for councilman because he was in favor of a city water works system.

Also a curious view is taken of the conduct of Mr. O'Neill by some old time democrats. They argue that in the present territorial convention a slip two years ago ought not to count against Mr. O'Neill for the reason that this is not a democratic convention. That it is made up of socialists, silver republicans, labor men and that it is a Hearst convention. That therefore a man's democratic record cannot properly be taken into consideration. They also point out that Hearst himself has set a precedent as a bolter and that in consequence it is quite proper that the national committeeman should have been a bolter from the democratic ticket.

Early in the campaign the name of Col. W. C. Greene was considered in connection with the office of national committeeman but Col. Greene was an anti-Hearst man, and when he and his friends were defeated in the south he ceased to be a possibility. But it has been suggested that in view of the bitter contest between Farish and O'Neill that it would be a good thing for party harmony if the anti-Hearst element having been overwhelmingly defeated should be given something now.
