legal, and that but for the part taken in it by the registering and election officers the bonds would not have been carried.

To this the defendant filed a motion to strike a demurrer and an answer. The motion to strike was directed against almost every paragraph of the complaint, or at least a part of almost every paragraph. Concerning the one in which it was alleged that the bonds would have been defeated but for the wrong and pernicious activity of the registering and election officers, objection was made that it was not only immaterial, irrelevant and superfluous, but that it was "an unwarranted invasion of the realm of prophecy."

The motion to strike was granted as to this paragraph, as well as to another in which it was alleged that the act of congress under which it was pretended the election was held was not applicable to Phoenix, and also as to another paragraph in which it was alleged that the election officers had openly worked in favor of the bonds. The motion was denied as to the rest of the complaint. The demurrer, though, was sustained. The ground of the demurrer was generally that none of the paragraphs of the complaint, either by themselves or in connection with other paragraphs, set forth issuable facts.

It is not understood that this is the ending of the case. When the demurrer was argued last month, Judge Almsworth, for the plaintiff, directed the attention of the court to the fact that this case was without precedent, and he intimated that he would prefer that the demurrer be sustained rather than that the case should be tried at length, only to be appealed to a higher court. In passing upon the demurrer yesterday morning, Judge Kent alluded to that statement by Judge Almsworth, and said that in view of the peculiar features of the case it would be better to let the complaint be tested in a higher court.

Maybe Bennett was seen yesterday afternoon, and said that the decision of the court was satisfactory, and he believed that the city would have no difficulty now in disposing of the bonds.

There was another interesting decision in the case of the territory by J. Elliott Walker against the Bartlett Herd Land and Cattle company for the collection of certain back taxes. This was a test case, which it was generally understood that the defense would win. The taxes sought to be collected had been levied upon improvements made on government land. In the case of the defendant, these taxes had accrued before it came into possession of the land to which they had been obtained in the meantime from government. The defendants were given judgment. This decision will clear the books of the county treasurer of a great deal of rubbish, and will remove a sort of cloud from the title to a great deal of property in the county.

The back taxes of this character amount to about \$14,000. In some cases the amounts are not more than \$2. By this test case, forced by the defendant, this debt is removed.



CITY WINS FIRST ROUND Demurrer to Water Company's Complaint Sustained.

The Phoenix Water company will have to continue in a higher court its action against the common council of the city of Phoenix to prevent the issue and sale of bonds to the amount of \$300,000 voted for the building of a municipal water-works system. The complaint was filed last spring, and a temporary injunction was asked for at once, but on account of the nature of the case Judge Kent declined to grant it before a hearing of the merits of the case.

The complaint recited the history of the water company and the Gardner franchise under which it is now operating. It was alleged in the complaint that the city was bound by the franchise not to enter into competition with the plaintiff, and that such a system as it was proposed to install would be a violation of that contract. It was also alleged that the bond election was illegal.

BIG OPTICAL BUSINESS.

I have not the figures before me of their 1902 or 1903 production, but in 1901 the American Optical Co. of Southbridge, Mass., Geo. W. Wells, president, sold 2,815,140 pairs of spectacles and eye-glasses, which is 5,283 pairs per day, or 15 1/2 pairs per minute. They likewise manufactured and sold 2,945,318 pairs of spectacle and eye-glass lenses, and 1,250,000 spectacle and eye-glass cases.

In addition to the above they manufacture great quantities of optical material, trial sets, and accessories, eye-glass chains and hooks, optical machinery, etc., and boxes.

It might also be interesting to set before your readers that the amount of gold and silver used in this factory during 1901 amounted to \$554,781; amount of gold-filled stock used \$147,257; amount of pay roll \$399,498; amount of lens stock for spectacles and eye-glasses used 115 tons; number of hands employed over 1,200. Their product during 1902 and 1903 has increased very materially, and they employ at the present time over 1,800 hands, so that without the question of a doubt, they are today by far the largest optical manufacturing industry in the world.

This great business in Mr. Wells' lifetime has grown from the output of one little frame building, employing some twelve to fifteen hands, to its present large proportions. This little frame building of one room, is still carefully looked after on their present site, and is the one that Mr. Wells himself learned his trade in some forty years ago.—Kansas City Jeweler and Optician.
