**FAMILY REUNIONS**—The family of E. Kays on north Second street were made happy this morning by the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Baldrige of Bloomington, Ill., who will spend the holidays in this city. Mrs. Baldrige was formerly the wife of an older brother of Mr. Kays who has been dead for some years. This is the first visit the Baldriges have made to Arizona, and it is needless to say they enjoyed the genial sunshine of Arizona Christmas day. Over on the other side of the United States there is another reunion of a part of the Kays family. Marion Kays who is attending the State university of Illinois is spending the holidays with his two brothers who are midshipmen at the U. S. Naval academy. Uncle Sam's boys get no Christmas leave but their life during the holidays is a little less strenuous and the three brothers will enjoy very much being together once more. Herbert, the older of the two midshipmen, is in the present first class which will be graduated the first of February. **TO WORK THE RAY**—Concerning the report that the owners of the Ray mine, one of the most famous old properties in Pinal county, are about to resume work upon it, the Florence Blade says: No authentic confirmation of these rumors was obtainable till Thursday last, at which time General Manager Gordon visited the Blade office and at the solicitation of the editor consented to say that arrangements were well under way for a resumption of operations at the mines. The annual assessment work on the unpatented claims of the group has been completed and Manager Gordon expects to receive orders soon after the first of the New Year to proceed with regular development work at the mines. The company has, wisely we think, decided to thoroughly develop the mines and look out large ore reserves before refitting the mill and starting it up so that there may be no cause for a cessation of operations at the latter on account of ore shortage. This is good news as it is authentic. There has never been a doubt in our minds as to the ultimate success of the Ray mines. We have been familiar with them for twenty-five years past and the development work prosecuted on them at different times during that period revealed no disappointing indications. If the Ray does not become, when systematically developed, a great producer, then all accepted guides in mineralogy and geology are a snare and a delusion.

**M'GREEVY TAKEN AWAY**

**Sheriff Hall Left With His Prisoner This Morning.**

Sheriff C. E. Hall of O'Neill, Neb., left this morning with B. M. McGreevy, the absconding president of the Elkhorn Valley bank of O'Neill. As the time for his departure approached, the banker grew more jovial and seemed to relish the notion of returning home after a flight of a little more than a month. He had been in jail here just a week.

Speaking of the reward which had been placed upon McGreevy and of which Captain H. McDonald will receive, Sheriff Hall said that the offer of a reward for \$800 was for the arrest and conviction of both McGreevy and Cashier Haggerty. The conviction he said would not be insisted on nor would it be waited for but only half of the amount offered would be paid for the arrest.

arrest of either of the bankers. He said that probably before his return home the sum of \$400 would be on the way to Captain McDonald.

It is probable that the case will be slightly complicated by a sensational report of the arrest of McGreevy which was sent out of Phoenix a day or two after the arrest. It was stated in that report that when the officer took McGreevy into custody, the latter told him that all he would get for arresting him would be \$800 and that he would do much better by him than that if he would let him go. He would give him \$8,000. It was added that the officer in order to ascertain where McGreevy had the money concealed asked him how he knew that he would get the money. McGreevy then showed him two certificates of deposit for \$25,000. When this story got into circulation inquiry was made by Nebraska papers and others regarding the amount of money which had been found on McGreevy. As a matter of fact he had at the time of his arrest only \$10 but he had also a certificate of deposit from the Phoenix National bank for \$1,000. No other money has since been discovered. Sheriff Hall is very much pleased with what he has seen of Phoenix in his stay of two days. He spent the greater part of yesterday in driving about the valley, visiting the ostrich farm, the Indian school and other points of interest.
