**GOING TO COLLEGE**—J. L. Fullwiler, the junior member of the Fullwiler Auction company left last night for Parkville, Mo., where he will attend college.

**GONE HOME**—Mr. and Mrs. B. E. Schilling of Florence who have been spending several months in Phoenix, expect to leave for home today. Mr. Schilling is engaged in mining in Pinal county.

**BOARD OF TRADE**—There was a short meeting of the board of trade last night after the Cave Creek meeting but nothing of special importance was done, other than the general discussion of questions before the board.

**TO THE HILLS**—W. H. Black will leave tomorrow for a trip to the Colorado river country. He expects to be gone about three months and the object of his mission is to find three or four large sized, world beating gold mines.

**WILL FIGHT THE CASE**—Ed Reeves, a harness maker, was arrested two or three days ago by the police on the charge of vagrancy. He has employed an attorney and will proceed to fight the case, or at least he says he will.

**DEATH OF MISS BAUM**—Miss Kate Baum, a daughter of C. M. Baum, died Monday morning at 3:30 o'clock. The funeral service will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock at the parlors of Eastling & Whitney. Rev. Lapsley A. McAfee will officiate.

**KING'S DAUGHTERS SOCIAL**—The King's Daughters will give a special at the First Baptist church next Thursday evening. It will be in the nature of a national tea. There will be an excellent musical and literary program and refreshments will be served. The entertainments given by this organization of workers are always very pleasant.

**DEATH OF FRANK JOHNSON**—Frank B. Johnson son of Mrs. E. A. Johnson died night before last of spinal meningitis after a long illness. The funeral will take place this afternoon at three o'clock from the family residence No. 315 North Fifth avenue. The dead man was born in this city June 15, 1871 and had spent the greater part of his life here.

**PHOENIX & EASTERN OPEN**—The new pile structure for the temporary repair of the Phoenix & Eastern railroad bridge at Tempe was finished yesterday and this morning trains on that line will begin running again over their own track all the way from Phoenix and on the regular schedule.

**SOMETHING DOING**—The Prescott Herald says: "This morning a rig left town containing Messrs. N. O. Murphy, Wm. A. Parish and an engineer by the name of Campbell, who were bound for Salt Creek to look over the property there belonging to Hickey and Rowe. The property is an excellent one and will bear investigation from an expert."

**PRESBYTERIAN CONGREGATIONAL MEETING**—The annual congregational meeting of the Presbyterian church will be held tonight at 7:30. Elders, trustees and other officers of the church will be elected, and reports for the past year from all branches of the church will be read. It is urged that not only members of the church but members of the congregation attend this meeting.

**SUITS, NEW AND OLD**—Maclovina Celeya was yesterday granted a divorce from J. P. Celeya, who she said had deserted her. The loss of this case from the docket was more than made good by several new suits, most of them on appeal from justice's courts. There was one foreclosure suit, the Gas, Water and General Investment, Ltd., against the Highland Water company and others.

**A RUNAWAY**—A delivery wagon and driver were given a furious whirl just before sundown on south First street, by an excited horse. The horse ran from Washington street almost to the southern limit of the city before he was stopped. It seemed to be a plain case of a scared horse with a rough mouth for the driver had both of the lines all the time and used all his strength in trying to stop the animal but it was all he could do to keep him in the road and keep from colliding with other vehicles. He narrowly missed two carriages between Washington and Jefferson streets, one of them driven by a woman.

**VISITING NEWSPAPER MAN**—Richard G. Lambert of Salt Lake City has been in Mesa City the last three or four days, looking after the interests of the Desert News and incidentally visiting with old friends. Mr. Lambert has been connected with the News for a great many years, having been for fifteen years its business manager. Since that time he has been an outside man looking after both business and correspondence. He has traveled over this section several times on periodical tours and is already well known. He has been in Arizona about a month on this trip, having spent the most of the time in Navajo, Apache and Graham counties. He says he never really understood what it means to travel in an arid region until this trip, during which he has encountered more mud than he ever saw before in his life in the same length of time. Mr. Lambert left for home on this morning's northbound Santa Fe.

**A BEREFT FAMILY**—Stewart Logie, little son of Rev. and Mrs. George Logie, died last Monday evening in Tucson and is to be buried in Flagstaff on Friday. Mr. and Mrs. Logie are expected here on the morning train from the south and will leave tomorrow on the Santa Fe. Mr. Logie is known to many people here as he has been in this city often during the seven years of residence in the territory. Until last fall he was pastor of the Presbyterian church of Flagstaff and left only that he might be in a lower altitude for his little son whose heart was affected by the elevation of Flagstaff. Last June he spent here supplying the pulpit of the Presbyterian church. In August he passed through the city on one of the detoured trains from California and the body of his only daughter for burial in Flagstaff. Stewart is the only other child of the family. Mr. Logie is now pastor of the Presbyterian church at Douglas. A few weeks ago it was discovered that the former trouble threatened the boy and his parents immediately started for Phoenix but because of the collapse of the Gila bridge they were stopped in Tucson. Word received only a few days ago gave hope that the change was restoring the child and the improvement was so marked that the father returned to Douglas leaving Mrs. Logie and Stewart in Tucson until the bridge should be thoroughly tested when they were to come here for treatment.


