Railroad Rate-making.

The speech of President Roosevelt at Raleigh on Thursday contained indirectly a correction of many statements which have been made regarding the coming railroad legislation which will be attempted in the next congress; it also corrects a misapprehension concerning the Esch-Townsend bill which failed in the last congress.

Many newspapers, ignorantly or carelessly, have led their readers to believe that it was the purpose of the Esch-Townsend bill as well as of the bill to be introduced to invest the interstate commerce commission with the rate making power, and in consequence among the uninformed there has been a greater or less clamor for the coming of that day.

Concerning the conferring of the rate making power on the commission or some other administrative body, the president had this to say: "When complaint is made of a given rate as being unjust or unreasonable, if it finds the complaint proper, then itself to fix a maximum rate which it regards as just and reasonable, this rate to go into effect practically at once, that is within a reasonable time, and to stay in effect, unless reversed by our courts."

So far as rate making is concerned the commission would be invested with little more power than it now has. If the proposed law were already in effect the commission would have just now no complaints to hear of unreasonable rates. The present conditions are that every traffic manager in the country is being besought to furnish cars for the millions of tons of freight the shippers want moved.

An odd feature, but one that is overlooked by many is the basic fact that the scarcity of a product results in an increased price for it. There is no single commodity in this country today in general use so scarce as transportation. But instead of the price of it having been increased there has been a slight decrease in general rates.
