THE PASSING AWAY OF JUDGE CAMPBELL

His Death Occurred at Los Angeles on Thursday.

The Los Angeles Examiner of Friday morning, arriving here yesterday morning, contained the following item:

"Judge Joseph Campbell of Phoenix, Ariz., died last evening at 948 Santee street. Deceased arrived here three days ago from Arizona, accompanied by his wife. Death was due to heart disease. Judge Campbell was forty-nine years of age and was well known in Arizona. The body was taken to Bresse Bros. Funeral arrangements will be announced later."

Though Judge Campbell has not resided in Phoenix for several years, he has called here occasionally on business, having lived during the last few years in eastern and southern Arizona towns. He was one of the leading lawyers and politicians of the territory during his residence in Phoenix a number of years ago, and went from here to Honolulu, but returned again, settling in the upper Gila valley. While a resident of Phoenix he filled various offices of public trust, such as district attorney, probate judge, and also represented this county in the legislature. He was for some time the business partner of Col. Tom Fitch, the silver-tongued orator. There was probably no man in the west better known to the early residents of Arizona than "Joe" Campbell, as he was familiarly called. He first came to Phoenix when a very young man and cast his fortunes with the territory.

He was first married to an adopted daughter of the late Judge De Forest Porter, the result of the union being two daughters, one of whom survives her father and is now a talented actress, making her home in Los Angeles. A separation followed between Mr. and Mrs. Campbell and the former some time afterward married the widow of the late Mickey Stewart, a well-known Arizonian.

DOWELL ACQUITTED OF GREATER CHARGE

On His Own Admission Convicted of Carrying Concealed Weapons.

When Charles Dowell admitted to District Attorney Bullard yesterday morning in Judge Johnstone's court that he had hit Leonard White over the head with a gun because he did not think he would give the man the dignity of hitting him with his fist, he did not know that he was making for himself future trouble, but that was the case. He was so positive in his statement that he used a gun that it could not be doubted. He explained that his fist was too good to use on any man who came between him and his wife. The fight argument was set-

ted by the court by discharging Dowell, for it was shown by the testimony that White had struck the first blow. A warrant, however, was immediately issued for his arrest on the charge of carrying concealed weapons, and for this he deposited a cash bond of \$25 for his appearance in court Monday morning.

Charges had been made against him shortly before the tendering of the resignation. The charges allege immorality on the part of the collector. Immediately after the sending in of the resignation, several candidates for the place sprang up. Among them was Mr. Griswold.


