THE ELECTROCUTION OF A BISBEE MAN

Hurled to Death From the Top of a Pole.

Chester Wyatt, a young man, 19 years of age, met his death by electrocution Friday afternoon of last week at Don Luis in Cochise county. He came in contact with a live wire while performing his duty as an electrician in the employ of the Bisbee Improvement company. The story is told by the Bisbee Review as follows:

The young man was hurled from the top of the pole to the ground, a distance of thirty feet, and before aid could reach him he was dead. The body was brought to the city as soon as viewed by Coroner Hogan of Lowell, who was brought to the scene of the man's death.

A sad feature of the death lies in the fact that the young man had but a short time since come to Bisbee from his home in Bedford, Ky., and had gone to work for the Bisbee Improvement company but an hour or so before death overtook him. In company with Construction Superintendent James Wyatt left Bisbee for Naco, where there were repairs to be made. At Don Luis James stopped and sent Wyatt to the top of a pole to inspect a transformer. Just what happened James is unable to explain. Seated in his buggy about thirty feet distant, James saw the body of the young man fall from the pole to the ground, lifeless.

The only plausible solution to the cause of death is in the presumption that Wyatt in some manner formed a circuit with the current in the transformer, probably by grasping one of the iron braces that hold the cross-tree to the pole, his death following.

The wire leading to the Don Luis transformer carried a current of 2200 volts. Wyatt was burned about the right hand and the calf of the left leg.

A brother, Bruce Wyatt, who works in the mines here, is heartbroken at the sudden end of his brother. Both of the boys came to Bisbee on April 22 from Bedford, Ky., hoping to make their fortunes in the west.

The remains of the young man will

be taken to the Wyatt home in Kentucky by Bruce Wyatt.

BISBEE FORGERY OF A PIE CARD

The Ravenous Appetite of a Youth Led Him to Jail.

A Bisbee youth committed a forgery several days ago and was apprehended and given a jail sentence of three days. The Bisbee Review tells the story as follows:

Friday morning John Keefe, aged 15, was brought before Judge McDonald for forging the name of a miner at the Copper Queen store. It seems that young Keefe and a few friends of his are in the habit of eating lunches at all hours of the day. These lunches are free as far as the boys are concerned, but when the cost of them is deducted from the pay check of a man named Francis, who works for the C. & A. Francis strictly objects. This is not the boy's first offense, as he has several times before gone to the Copper Queen store and after making purchases, varying in amount, signed the name of Francis. Yesterday morning he went to the store and after ordering a generous quantity of cantaloupes, beans and other delicacies, again took his pen in hand and dipped it in the ink, but he had bucked the Copper Queen credit system once too often and was caught. An officer was telephoned for and the boy was taken before Judge McDonald. The judge read the riot act to the boy until the youngster started to cry and wail and beg the justice not to send him to the reform school. The justice was aware of the boy's former transgressions and in order to impress on him the turpitude of forgery and show him to what he would come if he did not stop it, had him locked up for a day or two. The boy told the justice that his father had thrashed him for his former transgressions, but it is to be hoped that the day or two in jail will have more effect.
