WILL CASH THE BONDS.—When the First National Bank of Bisbee collapsed under the pressure of the panic a few months ago, the territory had a goodly sum of money on deposit in that institution. The territorial treasurer, however, was not worried in the slightest for he had stowed away in the vault as security \$25,000 worth of United States consols, due in 1939, and bearing 2 per cent. Ever since that time he has been holding them in the hope that the Bisbee institution could pull itself together, pay back the money and take the bonds. It has failed to do so, however, and yesterday the treasurer forwarded the bonds to a New York banking house with instructions to sell them on July 1st. Any proceeds over and above the amount the bank owes the territory will be turned over to the bank or its assigns.

C. formerly a well known cattle man and leading citizen of Arizona and New Mexico and at one time and another a resident of Phoenix, sometimes writes for the magazines. His latest appearance is in the July number of McClure's magazine, the subject of his sketch being Clifford Pinchot, chief of the forestry service. It is a very interesting article both on Mr. Pinchot and on the subject of forestry, and is illustrated by numerous pictures showing the result on the forests of destructive lumbering enterprises, and forests fires, the effect of erosion in unprotected forest belts and as well as some of the results of the reforestation of certain timbered sections. Beside being interesting reading the article has an educational value that is worth while in these days when the conservation of resources has become an important question.


