GLOBE PROSPEROUS BUSINESS BOOMING

George A. Mauk Visiting Phoenix Plugs For the Gila County Capital.

George A. Mauk, agent at Globe of the Gila Valley, Globe & Northern railroad company, arrived here yesterday for a stay of a day or two on business. Mr. Mauk accompanied the Elks excursion from Globe as far as Maricopa and says it was a jolly trainload that he had favored. The Globe contingent consisted of two Pullmans and a baggage car. At Benson two Pullmans from Bisbee and one from Douglas, all loaded with Elks, were added, making a train of nine coaches, and all of them full. There were no "rooms to let" by the time the train passed Maricopa, which was very soon after the Phoenix special passed through that gateway junction. The southern Arizona special was under the personal direction of E. A. Mason, traveling freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific. It was designed to have the two special trains enter Los Angeles in a procession.

Mr. Mauk says Globe is booming. The summer business there is about as lively as the winter business and June was really the best month for business since the panic. And this in addition to the fact that there is from Globe as well as Phoenix a constant outpouring of summer excursionists, though probably not so many as from this city.

The grading is practically finished on the extension of the G. V. G. & N. railroad from Globe to Miami, though there are a couple of bridges yet to be built, for which the piling has but recently arrived. A couple of miles of track was laid some time ago and the material for the rest of it is now on the ground, so it will be a short job when it is again undertaken. It is expected the steel will all be down between the middle of August and the first of September and that the event will be fittingly celebrated.

The Arizona Commercial smelter, a 400-ton plant, it is expected will be blown in about the first of September. This is a mining project of the Shannon people represented by Hayden Stone & Co. of Boston, and is another of the big Globe properties, the railroad running clear to the smelter-plant as it does also to the Old Dominion.

A half dozen fine new business blocks are under construction in Globe, one of the being a postoffice building to be built of brick on the east side of Broad street, nearly opposite the Dominion hotel. The project is that of a number of local capitalists who formed a corporation for constructing

A WIFE DESERTER FROM SAN BERDOO

OCCUPANT OF THE COUNTY JAIL.

He Added to His Crime the Elopement With a Young Girl.

A telegram was received at this office from San Bernardino yesterday making inquiry about Edgar Arnold, a street car conductor for whom a warrant had been issued charging him with wife desertion. He had run away with a young girl of good family and it had been learned there that they were in Phoenix.

It was learned on inquiry that Arnold was in custody. He and the girl were found at a lodging house where they had arrived on Thursday. They did not register but they were known there as Mr. and Mrs. Martin. No warrant had been issued for the arrest of the girl and she was turned over to friends for safekeeping. Arnold said that he would waive extradition and the San Bernardino authorities were wired to come after him.

The girl who comes of almost excellent family has relatives here and some acquaintances. She called on her acquaintances but said nothing to them about the presence of Arnold.

Her mother believing that she had run away with Arnold and suspecting that she might come to Phoenix telegraphed here to a nephew who had heard that the girl was in town though he had not seen her. On his behalf the warrant was issued.

When they were found yesterday the girl, who had borne an excellent reputation, said that she did not know why she had done such a thing. The seriousness of her step had not presented itself to her before and she said that she would be glad to get back home.

When it was pointed out to Arnold that his crime was about as badly managed an affair as could have been contrived, he admitted that he had not exercised good judgment in coming to Phoenix where the girl would naturally be looked for.


The girl herself did not think that vigorous steps would be taken to follow them. Mrs. Arnold, who had been aware of their relations in San Bernardino had told him that if he loved his affinity more than he did the mother of his children to take her and go. Her advice had been accepted and the girl supposed that the woman had meant what she said and would make no fuss about it. But one can never tell what a woman will do.

Arnold was not prepared for a very extensive elopement. He had only \$12 when he was arrested, not enough to pay his fare back home. But the great and generous state of California will undertake that expense and will perhaps contribute liberally to his support for some time, for wife desertion is a matter which arouses a great deal of interest in the courts over there.
