THE LAWYER AND HIS VICTIM.

An inquiry into the sanity of a
man who shot and killed another
man on a New York roof garden
which ended on Saturday, was re-
lieved of its monotony by a disclosure
of the curious relations existing be-
tween the prosecuting attorney and
the man whom he is trying to keep
in an asylum.

District Attorney Jerome and Harry
Thaw, according to every rule of un-
regenerated human nature, should be
sternly and forever precluded from
mutual sympathy. Jerome conducted
the prosecution in Thaw's murder
trials with zeal, intensity, unflinching
persistence and bitter severity which
sometimes have almost created sym-
pathy for the defendant. He has
blocked all of Thaw's efforts to re-
gain his freedom. In the inquiry
just concluded he has shown no
mercy to the man who was writing
and twisting in the meshes of the
law like a fly caught in a spider's
web.

Yet the newspaper reports repre-
sent these two men, when Thaw was
not on the witness stand and the
prosecutor had a moment's leisure
in the court room, as positively chummy.
They exchanged confidential communi-
cations with each other and each
laughed over what seem to be the
other's jokes.

How shall we explain such an ap-
parent contradiction of all that is
natural in such a case? Is it impos-
sible to maintain unintermittently
the tension of official antagonism on
the one hand and a sense of personal
injury on the other? We are ready to
believe all that has been said to the
effect that Thaw is a degenerate, a
paranoiac and everything else that
is bad in character, mental condition
and self indulgence; and yet it seems
that there is something in the fellow
that appeals even to such a fighter
and prosecutor as Jerome has been in
his case.

As for Jerome, we don't blame him
for relaxing his grim and bitter mood
occasionally and indulging in a joke
and a smile with his victim. Little
episodes of that character are to the
credit of human nature. Why should
a public prosecutor cherish personal
malice toward a defendant? Why
should he act or talk as if he hated
the man it is his duty to send to
prison or the chair if the evidence
warrants it? Why should he pump
his bile into his own arteries to
mingle with and poison the good red
blood that should be kept pure and
wholesome?

Yet many prosecutors do that, and
seem to think that thereby they are
proving their devotion to the public
good. After the minister and the
doctor no other man should be more
on his guard to keep sweet and
gentle-mannered than the lawyer who
has a case against a criminal in
court.

THE IMPRISONED CZAR.

Judging from the magnificent seclu-
sion of the Russian czar on his
recent visit to England, he is allowed
less real personal liberty than an
ordinary prison "trustee." While he
is not actually confined in prison, he
is practically restricted to his war
vessel, which was constantly surround-
ed by 150 vessels of the British navy.
His position is in marked contrast
with that of Alfonso, the youthful
ruler of Spain, who walks alone the
streets of his capital as usual, not-
withstanding the apparently critical
state of his kingdom. When Alfonso
visits England he indulges in such
popular diversions as please his

taste, and King Edward allows him-
self much personal liberty when vis-
iting other countries. Emperor Nich-
olas, on the other hand regards
practical seclusion as necessary and
must sometimes envy the most hum-
ble of his jockies, who at least can
be accorded occasional shore leave
without the certainty of assassination.

The case of the New Jersey woman
who asked for a divorce because her
husband would not talk is matched
by that of the woman who wishes to
be rid of her spouse because he failed
to match a sample of pongee silk for
her. If the pongee silk test were to
be applied to husbands generally, it
is to be feared that the divorce
courts would suddenly find them-
selves overwhelmed with business.

A contemporary says that Speaker
Cannon is "narrow" and spiteful be-
cause he refused his opponents im-
portant places on the house com-
mittees. Not necessarily. Assuming
that the speaker is a believer in his
own policy, it would have been the
height of folly for him to place men
in a position to obstruct that policy.

The new penny bearing the head
of Lincoln is interesting as a novelty,
but its popularity would be very
much enhanced if its purchasing
power should prove greater than that
of the old design.

Perhaps if Texas could arrange to
transplant the Platte river Mr. Bryan
would be more willing to move to
that state. It was as the "boy orator
of the Platte" that he first rose to
fame.


