INTEREST IN IRRIGATION BY PEOPLE OF TUCSON

Judge Kibbey Addresses a Meeting on
Water Users Association.

Former Governor Kibbey yesterday returned from Tucson where he had gone at the invitation of Professor R. H. Forbes of the university, to address the farmers under the Rillito and the business men of Tucson on the organization of a water users association. A project has for some time been on foot to form such an association for making the best use of the waters of the Rillito in the irrigation of about 10,000 acres of land lying under it.

The advice of Judge Kibbey was naturally sought as he is perhaps the chief recognized authority in such matters. He prepared the organization of the Salt River Valley Water Users' association, the first formed under the reclamation act and whose articles have been copied with comparatively little alteration by subsequently formed associations.

At the close of his address Judge Kibbey was given an ovation by the audience. His address, an able and interesting one, is printed in full by the Tucson Star.
