HERE FROM FLORENCE—R. G. Guffy of Florence was in the city yesterday on business, and much of the time was spent in visiting old acquaintances.

POSTOFFICE HOURS—The post-office will be kept open until noon today and the mail carriers will make one delivery of mail.

CAME FROM MESA—Daniel Mahoney came over from Mesa yesterday on one of the motor cars and registered at the Commercial hotel. He will return this morning after attending to business in Phoenix.

REMOVAL OF CONVICTS—Guard Van Siclen of the penitentiary force on Saturday took from Yuma to Florence a consignment of prisoners who expect to make the latter city their permanent place of residence. They are all life term men. In the next transfer of prisoners, which will be at an early day, it is expected that the last of the convicts will be moved from Yuma to the new prison.

They learned yesterday that the happy event was consummated nearly a week ago. Miss Sadie Miles being the bride and Justice Parker officiating.

THE GRAND THEATER—The many patrons of the Grand theater announces that patrons of that amusement resort it may prepare themselves for a pleasing surprise next week in the shape of a new company of talented artists. Though details are withheld for later announcement, assurance is given that it will not be a fake company nor any other than a high-class aggregation of entertainers. It is also announced that if the weather permits, another dance will be held this evening in the Grand air-dome.

GALVESTON'S GROWTH—Notwithstanding all its bad luck, the city of Galveston continues its remarkable growth. As a point of export it ranks second only to New York and holds ninth place among the ocean ports in the value of imports. The Galveston News in its September 1 trade edition says: "The port of Galveston is served by thirty-five steamship lines in trade with foreign countries and five coastwise lines, having the best New York service of any port on the Gulf or South Atlantic. The total number of vessels entering and clearing the port during the year was 1672, having a combined tonnage of 4,567,293 net tons, an increase of 128 vessels and a net tonnage of 720,991. The end of the grade raising is in sight. The stupendous contract will probably be finished early in January, when approximately 12,000,000 cubic yards of filling will have been placed inside of the sea wall. Work has been started on the causeway connecting Galveston with the main land. This structure will cost \$1,500,000."

A SMALL ATTENDANCE—The church attendance last night at all of the churches was considerably smaller than usual on account of the inclement weather.

TO ATTEND SICK BROTHER—Hiram Corn of Center Point, Iowa, arrived here yesterday morning via the southern route to attend his brother, Schuyler Corn, a well known carpenter, who is critically ill at his rooms in the city and who has no other relatives here. He has been suffering for about six weeks, and for the last week has been confined to his bed with a brain affection.

WILL OUTDO TUCSON—The Phoenix Elks are making plans that will put the entertainment and hospitality of the Tucson Elks, shown to the Phoenix Elks on the recent excursion there, far in the shade. On September 19 the city will be wide open to the southern antlered herd. Even the airdomes are making special preparations in the line of entertainment and will run open houses.

GOOD MEN WANTED—The United States civil service commission announces an examination on September 23, 1909, to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill a vacancy in the position of horticulturist, Philippine service, at a salary of not to exceed \$1800 per annum, and vacancies requiring similar qualifications as they may occur in that service. It is desired to secure persons who are graduates of agricultural colleges and who have had horticultural experience in tropical or semi-tropical countries. There will be no educational examination for this position. Applicants will be rated according to their training and experience as shown in application Form No. 375. Age limit 18 to 40 years on the date of examination. On September 22 there will be an examination of applicants for the position of editor, bureau of Education, department of the interior, at \$2600 per annum, and vacancies requiring qualifications as they may occur in that department, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement, transfer or promotion. As no properly qualified eligibles were secured as a result of the examination announced to be held on July 14, 1909, for this position, qualified persons are urged to enter this examination.

RAID OPIUM JOINT—An opium joint was raided at Bisbee Thursday night and three were arrested. It is the intention of the Bisbee authorities to run the "hop" into the ground.

DUEL IN ALLEY—In a drunken brawl at Douglas Saturday morning a saloon keeper and policeman exchanged shots. Russell, the policeman, was struck through the ribs into the spinal column and will probably die as the result. Williams, the saloon keeper, was shot in the shoulder. The real cause of the fray is not known, though it is thought it grew out of the fact that the saloon keeper had been serving drinks to a woman in an automobile at the rear of the saloon.

LIBERTY SCHOOL DISTRICT—School matters in the Liberty section seem to be in rather a mixed condition. There is no big row on, but just a sort of a situation of not knowing what to do. The original Liberty district and the one adjoining it were sparsely settled and covered considerable territory, so the plan of consolidating them was devised on the theory that a bigger and better school would serve all residents. The consolidation was effected by the supervisors in accordance with the request of the settlers. It now transpires that a number of residents living at one end find themselves too far from the probable site of the joint district school to easily send their small children, and, anyhow, it has occurred to them that perhaps what they need is more little schools for little children instead of fewer schools of higher grade. Most of the children are small and the more advanced pupils will probably seek a larger school than even the joint district could provide. It is understood, therefore, that the residents in one end of the district are preparing to petition the supervisors to again divide the district, probably on slightly different lines from the former boundaries, so they can have a district of their own. They admit that they slept on their rights in not appearing before the board to oppose consolidation, but little atten-
