GOES TO GRAND JURY FOR PRICE OF A DRINK

Juan Quinones, a Yaqui by nationality and a hanger-on around the saloons by profession, was yesterday taken to the county jail by Constable Burton, where he will await the action of the grand jury next October for taking a 25-cent piece from an 8-year-old boy and getting caught at it.

Luz Ochoa was sent down town by his mother to purchase brandy for medicinal purposes on Wednesday, and was instructed to go to a saloon and have some one purchase the liquor for him. The youngster did as he was told, and the inviting attitude of Quinones, who was loitering in the rear of a saloon, suggested to the boy that he had found some one to make the necessary purchase. The boy accosted the man and told him his mission, but Quinones refused to be interested until he saw the 25-cent piece, and then he instantly became interested. It was brought out that the boy did nothing more than show the piece of money until Quinones pounced upon him, and taking the money, rushed into the saloon and purchased the liquor, but he failed to follow instructions and purchase brandy and have it placed in a bottle, but rather he made his own selection and proceeded to place it in a receptacle which he has with him constantly and which it is next to impossible to keep filled. At any rate, the youngster soon set up a howl that attracted the attention of Marshal Peterson, who soon had Quinones on the way to the hold-over. Judge Irwin late Wednesday evening placed the bond of Quinones at \$200 to wait the action of the grand jury. Yesterday morning Mrs. Ochoa, the mother of the lad, practically verified her son's version of the affair in every detail. Another Mexican was found who also stated that he saw Quinones struggling with the lad.

ROUGH RIDERS' REUNION.

W. H. The following letter from the H. Woods company, the representatives handling the Mesa cantaloupe crop for the past several seasons, will explain the general conditions of the product. The acreage, however, is believed to be a little larger than that intimated in the letter:

"Chicago, April 22, 1910.
"The Board of Directors, Mesa Melon Growers' Association.
"Gentlemen—Answering your favor of the 17th inst., we note with regret the fact that you had only about 155 acres signed up to date, and that even Glendale is besting us. Is there anything we can suggest that will bring this acreage up to at least 200 or 250? It seems a shame that Mesa is going to have a small acreage this year, inasmuch as California is very early, and will be mostly June melons, and this certainly is the year for Mesa, to hit it right, if she will come along with the quality and quantity.
"On the other hand, the growers that comprise this 155 acres should certainly have something to be proud of at the end of the coming season if present conditions prevail. It stands the growers in hand to hoe and cultivate thoroughly, so as to produce a heavy yield.

USING STORED WATER.

After the meeting of the stockholders of the Utah canal at this place Wednesday afternoon, the disposition of the land owners under that canal with regard to turning over their property was expressed to I. C. Hill, supervising engineer, by W. W. Dohson and D. P.
