UTAH CANAL GOING GOING

Only Seven Stockholders Voted Against Sale

HOW IT MUST BE DONE

Not Being An Incorporated Concern, the Transfer To The Government Must Be Made Individually By the Shareholders

Another all day session of the stockholders of the Utah Canal company yesterday resulted in a partial sale of that portion of the southside system to the government. It must be understood at the outset that the Utah Irrigation Ditch company is not an incorporated organization and that it will be necessary for the stockholders to individually sell their rights in the system before it can be sold to be owned by the government. The vote yesterday, had the canal been an incorporated body would have constituted a sale, that is provided a two-thirds of the majority of the stock would have constituted a majority. At the meeting yesterday there were ninety-seven shares represented both by proxy and individual owners. Out of the ninety-seven votes present there were but seven cast against the proposition of a sale. Preceding the vote there was the usual round of interrogations and more than one surprise was sprung when the time of voting was reached. The officials of the meeting and those who have been instrumental in getting the stockholders lined up for the sale were agreeably surprised in no less than a half dozen instances in seeing some of the more radical insurgents walk up and sign the "pledge," a localism that was applied to the proposition submitted by the government which it was required that all stockholders voting in the affirmative should sign.

In view of the fact that the Utah canal cannot be sold until practically every stockholder has signed the agreement a committee consisting of the same membership as the committee already appointed for the purpose of securing proxies, was continued. It is believed that this committee will be the means of securing enough additional votes from non-resident stockholders and others who were not present yesterday to make the majority enough so that the reclamation officials will consider the proposition of taking the canal over even though the one hundred and twenty-eight shares in the canal do not vote in favor of the proposition. The point which is to be conveyed in this instance is that the secretary will hardly demand that two or three or even a half dozen shares voting against the proposition of selling the canal should postpone the transfer of the canal indefinitely.

The proposition on which the stockholders voted yesterday and subscribed their names was as follows:

Proposed Terms of Purchase of the Utah Irrigating Ditch Company's Canal and Laterals by the United States.

1. That the Utah Irrigating Ditch company and constituent members thereof will convey to the United States clear title to the Utah irrigating ditch and laterals.
2. That the said company and shareholders thereof will give their consent to the transfer of the water of the Utah Extension company from their said canal to the canal system belonging to the United States for the delivery of the water to the lands under the said Extension company canal. Also to agree with said Utah Extension company to terminate the contract made under date of October 8th, 1887, between it and the Alamo Irrigating Ditch company, predecessors of the Utah Extension company.
3. In consideration of the transfer of said property and the terms and conditions above provided, the United States will give to each stockholder in said company as shown by its records, not exceeding in all a total of shares, credit to the amount of for each share of stock held by him upon the construction charges of the Salt River Project, which may hereafter be levied against his lands provided said shareholder is a duly qualified shareholder in the Salt River Valley Water Users' association, and makes application for water right under the Salt River Project.
4. Until the Salt River Project is opened the United States will divert and carry to the lands belonging to all shareholders of said company who are or shall become members of the Salt River Valley Water Users' association, such water as the said lands may be entitled to and is available from the natural flow of Salt river upon the payment in advance by said land owners, to the United States at the beginning of each irrigation season, such charge for water service as may be charged other members of the said association for like services.
5. The United States agree to divert and carry to the lands belonging to all shareholders of said company

who are not now and who do not become members of said Salt River Valley Water Users' association, such water as the last said lands may be entitled to and is available from the natural flow of Salt river upon the payment in advance by said non-members of said association to the United States the sum of \$..... at the beginning of each summer irrigating season and the sum of \$..... at the beginning of each winter irrigating season, making a total service charge of \$.....

7. All the shareholders of the company must be parties to the agreement.

That agreement shall not become effective until approved by the secretary of the interior.

9. That upon the approval of the secretary and the performance of the stipulations above provided, the company shall deliver possession of the canal and laterals to the United States which shall upon the delivery thereof, operate the same in accordance with terms herein contained pending the examination of the title of said property by the officers of the United States.

After the vote had been taken on the above proposition, the question of arranging the business of the Utah Canal company and the Utah Enlargement and Extension company came up for discussion. It will be remembered that the Utah Canal and Enlargement company, more commonly known as the Extension has a three-eighths right through the Utah canal. Immediately after the meeting of the Utah canal proper the stockholders of the Utah Extension called a meeting and of course soon reached a decision to sell. As a matter of fact the Utah Extension stockholders have always been more or less in favor of transferring to the government.

ANOTHER PUMPING PLANT IS PLANNED BY HEARD

Will Develop 500 Inches Near the San Francisco West of Town.

It is understood that the Bartlett-Heard Lumber and Cattle company is planning to put in another pumping plant sometime in the near future. The new plant will be installed a couple of miles west of Tempe, just across the San Francisco canal and will be on the north side of the road.

A four-inch test hole is now being sunk for the purpose of ascertaining the depth and character of the gravel. Largely upon the results of this test will depend the location of the plant. If all is favorable it will be put there and it is planned to develop a five hundred inch stream to be used under the San Francisco canal in connection with the present supply. The question of power has not yet been fully decided upon but it is possible that if suitable terms can be made with the government, Roosevelt power will be used.
