**STORED WATER SUPPLY.**  
The elevation of water above the Roosevelt dam yesterday was 56.25 feet, indicating a stored supply of 20,410 acre feet. At Granite Reef the flow of the Salt and Verde rivers was 26,661 miner's inches and at the joint head the flow of the Salt was 2540 inches. On the north side 5261 inches were used yesterday for irrigation purposes, while 10,560 inches were used on the south side. The schedule of water delivery for today follows: Arizona, eight hours to quarter section; Grand-Appropriators, dry; Maricopa, dry; Salt, twelve hours.

**OF LOCAL INTEREST**  
**SMITH FAMILY**—Announcement has been made of the second dance of the season of the Smith family, which will occur Friday evening in Melcer's hall.  
**REGISTER ILL**—Frank Parker, register of the United States land office, was confined to his home yesterday by a slight illness. He is expected to be out today.  
**CHINA AND WATER COLOR.**—There is an exhibition in the windows of the Miller-Sterling company several samples of the work of Mrs. Lucien Edwards in china and water colors. Mrs. Edwards secured a premium at the territorial fair. She has lately arrived here from Kansas City and has opened a studio at 390 North Fourth avenue.  
**PHOENIX VISITORS**—T. E. Parish of Los Angeles is visiting Phoenix accompanied by his brother, John B. Parish. Both are mining engineers, as is also another brother, William Parish of Denver, and all of them are well known and occasional visitors to the territory on professional business. T. E. Parish is residing here for many years. This is the first visit of John B. Parish to Phoenix for four years.

**FINE CHRYSANTHEMUMS**—A large and beautiful bouquet of chrysanthemums was presented to the board of trade yesterday by Mrs. R. H. Caskey of 1001 South Second avenue. Mrs. Caskey is an enthusiastic chrysanthemum grower and has thirty-one varieties, or about all she ever heard of, in her yard. The earlier varieties are just now coming into flower, but those with the largest blossoms will not flower until later in the season. Mrs. Caskey does not believe there is a finer place in the world for the growing of chrysanthemums than right here in Phoenix. In fact she has proved as much in her own yard.  
**TO TEST LAW**—Suit was filed yesterday by T. J. Prescott, city attorney, at the instance of the common council of the city of Phoenix, against the Consolidated Telephone, Telegraph & Electric Co. for the collection of \$100 and interest on same at 12 per cent from November 15, 1909, together with the costs of the suit. It is set forth in the complaint that the defendant has real and personal property which was last year assessed and the city taxes for which amounted to \$185; that the \$85 was paid but the remainder has not been paid. It is understood the action is to test the law in respect of the process companies for the payment of personal property taxes, on the theory that the tax collected by statute of a percentage of their tolls absolves them from any other tax.

**THE BUILDING FUND**—The Women's club of Phoenix will hold its annual bazaar for the benefit of the club building fund Tuesday, Nov. 22, afternoon and evening. In the afternoon there will be booths for the sale of all manner of useful and pretty things, the sale beginning at 2:45 p. m., and at 5 o'clock a supper will be served for those who would rather spend their money for something to eat. The bazaar has become an annual event with the club and it has always been well attended and profitable. The women expect it will be even a better one this year and are inspired to greater efforts with the rapid growth of the fund they hope some day to be transformed into a club home.
