SPORED WATER SUPPLY.

The elevation of water above the Roosevelt dam yesterday was 69.85 feet, indicating a stored supply of 21,673 acre feet. At Granite Reef the normal flow of the Salt and Verde rivers was 22,437 miners' inches, while at the joint head of the flow of the Salt was 2,660 inches. On the north side 12,925 inches were used for irrigation purposes, while 11,420 inches were used on the south side. The schedule of water delivery for today follows: Arizona, 8 hours to quarter section; Grand-Appropriators, 12 hours; Maricopa, 24 hours; Salt, dry.

OF LOCAL INTEREST

AN INFREQUENT VISITOR—Mr. J. George Hilzinger of Tucson was in the city a short time yesterday shaking hands with old friends. Mr. Hilzinger spent a part of the afternoon at Mesa. He left for Tucson last night.

INSURANCE AGENCY—The Golden State Life Insurance company has recently established an agency in Phoenix, with William L. Burt and J. O. Magaw in charge. Mr. Magaw and Mr. Burt have been in Phoenix some days, and are highly enthusiastic over the prospects. They expect to have an office in the National Bank of Arizona building as soon as that structure is completed. The Golden State is comparatively a new company, but is rapidly growing.

LEAVING FOR HOME—J. C. Evans of Roosevelt, who for more than sixty days past has been a temporary resident of Phoenix, and as doorkeeper of the constitutional convention did his best to restrain the members of that body from over-impetuosity, will leave for home today. He feels that in his humble way he did all he could to give Arizona a good constitution and if the people don't like it they ought not to blame the doorkeeper. It might have been worse if he had allowed every Tom, Dick and Harry to cry the sacred tribune who sought to do so. Mr. Evans is a democrat and a defender of the people and he is willing to make oath that neither John D. Rockefeller nor Andrew Carnegie ever for a minute got through the door to buy up any lawmakers, for he knows them personally through their pictures in the papers. Mr. Evans returns to Roosevelt to resume his position as chief justice (of the peace) of that precinct, and to construe the law for the best preservation of the peace and quiet of Arizona's only inland port for lake traffic.

AN UNCONQUERED WORLD—Men have conquered almost everything they have undertaken, but there is at least one exception that has thus far baffled both man and boy, and that is the climbing of an electric light pole with a wheeled vehicle. Numerous attempts have been made to scale these poles with automobiles, but they have always met with defeat. Early yesterday morning a lad made the latest effort to climb a pole with a bicycle on Central avenue just north of the town ditch. The pole along there stand very close to the bicycle path. Some wheelmen travel on one side and some on another. This boy tried to climb right over the pole. His head was down and he was traveling at a good speed when he struck the pole head on and fell back to the ground badly dazed. Two gentlemen who chanced to be passing ran to him, thinking he had killed himself, but he soon recovered his breath and full consciousness, got up, shook himself, climbed on the wheel and rode away without uttering a word, not even telling his name.

EQUIPMENT FOR RIVER WORK—Four carloads of Fresno scrapers and other equipment for levee building and six carloads of cables, left here last night for Yuma. The outfit was consigned to Killbeck & Williams, one of the firms sub-contracting from Dr. J. C. Norton for work in levee building on the lower Colorado river.

BUYS PERCHEON MARES—Louis Sands, of near Guadalupe, has purchased one of the handsome thoroughbred teams of Percheon mares offered for sale by the Higley Horse and Mule company. Mr. Sands has some other full blood stock of the same strain and expects to breed from these.

TRIAL FOR ASSAULT—The case of Francisco Parra and three other Mexicans who brutally assaulted Robert Arlington, a cook at the Regal lodging house cafe a few nights ago, will come before Justice Johnstone today for preliminary examination. Arlington was able to remove the bandages from about his head yesterday and walk to the office of the justice, but he is yet far from being in good fighting condition.

THE LAW DAY—The usual law day session of the district court will be held today, Judge Kent having returned from Florence. He went there last Friday morning to try the damages in the Ray Consolidated Mining company, growing out of the death of R. P. Coleman, W. H. Freeland, Jr., and two others in an explosion which occurred last February. After the trial was begun the cases were transferred to this county. The date of the trial here has not been fixed.

DIED SUDDENLY—Mrs. H. M. Woods died very suddenly of heart disease in Bisbee Thursday night. She was a prominent member of the Order of Eastern Star and many friends all over the territory. Her husband was a member of the legislature a few years ago, Mrs. Woods being in Phoenix with him during the session, and during that time she made the acquaintance of a large number of Phoenix people who will regret sincerely her untimely death.

MAY GO TO NEBRASKA—W. A. Duhansen, the crack third baseman of the Jewels, is in correspondence with the president of the Lincoln (Neb.) Baseball club relative to a place on that team. The Lincoln team is of the Western league and it is probable that Duhansen will next year be found playing in the Nebraska league, where if he makes good, he may be advanced to the Western league. His ability has come to the notice of the heads of these leagues and it is probable that he will be given a try-out the coming season.

RYUS AT WORK—For the purpose of sounding the sentiment of Tucson in regard to the proposed flight of Hubert Latham, the French motoplanist, from Phoenix to that place, the Phoenix board of trade directors will meet again Monday to consider Latham's offer and Ryus expects to be present at that meeting.

TRINITY CHURCH—Services will be held tomorrow, fourth Sunday in Advent, in Trinity church, South Second avenue, facing the courthouse, the Rev. Julius W. Atwood, rector, as follows: Holy communion at 9 o'clock; kindergarten and Sunday school at 10 o'clock; morning prayer and sermon by the Rev. Arthur W. Mason of Lawrence, Mass., at 11 o'clock. At the latter service the quartet choir, under the direction of Mrs. Defty, will give the following selections: Organ voluntary, choral prelude, Henri Deshayes; "Te Deum" and "Benedictus"; Woodward; offertory anthem, "Lift Up Your Heads"; Ferdinand Dantley; postlude, Lemargie.

RAYMOND CLOSE BACK—Raymond I. Close, a son of Mrs. J. W. Crenshaw, arrived in Phoenix yesterday from San Bernardino, where he is now conducting an undertaking establishment. Mr. Close formerly worked for several Phoenix undertakers, going to San Bernardino less than a year ago. He says that San Bernardino is a lively place, though not a bit livelier than Phoenix. It is his intention to remain until after the holidays. Two other Phoenix young men now in San Bernardino are Walter Gentry, who is employed in a clothing store, and Wesley Knorpp, formerly of The Republican, who is working for the Free Press.

GOING EAST—Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Williams left last night on the Santa Fe California limited for Chattanooga, Tennessee.

CHESTY BASEBALL PLAYERS—It is gossip among the baseball fans of high school circles and lads of similar age that the Junior Bible class team of the Presbyterian church is producing a very formidable aggregation of players. The latter say that Coach G. A. Judson of the high school is desirous of signing up four of their number to the Junior high school team to effect an organization that can peel the skin off the senior high school team. The J. B.
