TEMPE ONE WELL FINISHED ANOTHER NEARLY SO Things Moving Lively at the Reclamation Camp, West of Town.

Good progress is now being made on the wells being driven by the Reclamation service on the San Francisco canal, two miles west of Tempe. One well has been completed and tested out. This well was put down to a depth of 170 feet, but the last twenty feet or so were drilled in sandstone, and the value of the well was not at all increased. Consequently, the following wells will not be put down as deep, probably not deeper than 140 or 150 feet.



MESA MAN IN KANSAS.

SUNDAY LABOR.

Should a stranger visit Mesa on Sunday at this season of the year, he would imagine this was an ungodly country. Especially if he should happen at the depot. Saturday night the cantaloupe men worked until after midnight, loading melons on the cars, and started in again at daylight Sunday morning. Melons ripen on the Sabbath day as well as on week days and to suspend during the Sunday hours would mean the loss of thousands of dollars. One day's delay in picking and shipping means the loss of all melons ripened that day. They do not keep in condition for shipping long after they are ripe. They must be on cold storage as soon as possible. Hence the Sunday work. The churches were not deserted yesterday, however, as the ladies and children, young to gather melons, and those whose duties lie along different lines than cantaloupe growing, made a respectable showing at the Sunday schools and church services. Mesa is a church town, a fact that attracts a fine class of citizenship to this section.

A SMART LITTLE SUIT.

BOYSE suits are always the best for the tiny boys and this one is rendered novel and exceptional by the inserted trimming portion. In the illustration the suit is made of striped material and this trimming piece is simply cut on the cross, but a great many attractive blouses are made with the trimming portions of embroidered banding or of some contrasting material. Scalloped edges are much used for little boys' suits and the edges of the blouse scalloped, with the trimming portion of embroidered banding while the suit is made of pique or linen, makes an exceedingly handsome combination. Such suits are used for almost every material that little boys wear. For every-day occasions galatea and sturdy materials are liked; for afternoons pique, linen and the like, and for very dressy occasions silk of a heavy ribbed sort is fashionable. Later the same model can be made up in light-weight wool. Shepherd's check with the edges piped with red and trimming portions cut on the bias would be both simple and smart as well as durable.
