BOOST FOR THE MOTOR PARADE

That is the Specific Instruction of the Board of Trade But Plugging for Capital Excursion is Also in Order.

The board of directors of the board of trade held their weekly meeting yesterday afternoon. Some routine business was transacted, some new work laid out but the chief business of the day was consideration of the reports of committees and plans presented by them, for the Capital Excursion to Hayden on the 14th and the automobile parade on the night of March 9th.

Concerning the latter it is already an assured success but the board wants every automobile in Phoenix that can wiggle under its own power, to be found in the procession, and to be decorated. Governor Hunt, Chief Justice Franklin and Mayor Christy will be asked to perform the delicate task of reviewing the parade and naming the cars that are entitled to the prizes offered. Among these are three pushmobile trophies it is expected will be supplied by the three Phoenix daily newspapers. The garages will be asked to furnish marshals for the parade which will be on Saturday night March 9, from 8 to 10, and will be followed by a big open air dance in front of the Hotel Adams from 10 to 12. Money for the lights and music has already been raised.

Plans for the Hayden excursion are coming along finely and it is believed the trip to the big copper district will be made by a large number.

DIXON MAKES VICIOUS ATTACK ON MR. TAFT

Roosevelt's Manager Openly Charges President of the United States With Bribery by Patronage.

[Associated Press Dispatch] WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—Senator Dixon, chairman of the executive committee of the Roosevelt movement, in a statement issued tonight said of President Taft's campaign for a re-nomination: "Never in the history of American politics has more flagrant prostitution of the power of federal patronage been witnessed than when in certain southern states a batch of ten federal offices was put up at auction for future delivery to the highest bidder in delegates at the republican national convention. Open acknowledgment that political patronage has been and is being withheld from the duly elected and accredited republican senators and representatives in congress who would not pledge personal allegiance to the re-nomination of the presidential candidate has caused thoughtful men to inquire whether bribery by the direct use of money is any less reprehensible than bribery by promise of office."

[Associated Press Dispatch] CARSON, Feb. 29.—The extraordinary session of the legislature adjourned late today having passed all the administration measures except the tax corporation measure. No attempt was made to amend the divorce law or that regulating prize fights. The attempt to pass a corporation tax law was defeated in the senate.

DIX IS FIRM. Says He Does Not Regret Action in Brandt Case.

[Associated Press Dispatch] ALBANY, Feb. 29.—Branding Folke E. Brandt as a confessed forger, and declaring until shown conclusively that the former valet of Mortimer Schiff did not commit the crime for which he was sentenced to thirty years' imprisonment, Governor Dix in a statement tonight says he will justify and maintain his claim that Brandt is not worthy of pardon. The governor says the statement is his "farewell word" in the case unless the higher courts set aside the writ of habeas corpus on which Brandt won his release. The governor declares he has no regret for his action and offers no excuse. Moral as well as legal considerations, he says, influenced him.
