CHAVEZ GETS OUT ON LESSER CHARGE

Man Who Stabbed Acuna Pleads Guilty and is Fined \$30.

Jose Chavez, the Mexican who stabbed Manuel Acuna in a drunken quarrel early Sunday morning was brought over from Phoenix Wednesday morning to appear before Judge Irwin. The Mexican was at first to plead self defense to a charge of assault with intent to kill but his employer, George Wilbur, spoke a good word for the Mexican and agreed to pay his fine and after a conference with the district attorney's office Judge Irwin decided to allow the sheep herder to plead guilty to a charge of assault and battery.

In the quarrel Chavez was set upon by six of his countrymen and stabbed Acuna who happened to be the first to reach him. It was feared for a time that the victim would not recover but he had so improved that he was able to leave the hospital yesterday. The prisoner pleaded guilty to the reduced charge and was fined \$30 and costs which was paid by Mr. Wilbur and Chavez was taken out to the ranch and placed in the custody of his employer.

Cream Cake

Makes You Hungry to Look at It

When a company arrives unexpectedly, a cream cake often covers an otherwise embarrassing situation, for it answers the place of any other dessert as it can be stirred up quickly.

One-half cup butter; 1 cup sugar; yolks of 2 eggs, beaten light; 1 1/2 cups sifted flour; 2 level teaspoons K.C. Baking Powder; 1/2 cup cold water; whites of 2 eggs, beaten dry.

Cream the butter; add the sugar, yolks of eggs and water; then the flour, sifted three times with the baking powder; lastly the whites of eggs. Bake in two or three layers; put these together with cream filling, and dredge the top with confectioner's sugar.

One-fourth cup sifted flour; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1 cup hot milk; 1 egg, beaten light; 1/2 cup sugar; 1 teaspoonful vanilla extract; 1 ounce chocolate.

Mix flour and salt with a very little cold milk; stir into the hot milk and cook ten minutes; add the chocolate and stir until it is melted, and evenly blended with the flour mixture, then beat in the egg mixed with the sugar, and lastly the vanilla.
