

DICKEY GETS SIXTY DAYS

Order Signed for Removal of J. B. Goodwin From Prison at Florence for "Safe Keeping"

In the United States district court yesterday Judge Mack denied the motion of attorneys for W. L. Dickey for a new trial and sentenced the defendant to serve sixty days in the county jail. Dickey was convicted of defrauding the government by securing possession of government land by means of improper entry. In this case the prosecution contended the entrymen were innocents who immediately relinquished their rights to Dickey.

The next case to be put upon trial is that of the United States of America against the Fishbein Water Company. This is a suit to cancel certain mining claims which the government alleges the company filed on in bad faith, and which it is further alleged it is using to supply Fishbein water, and which it is the alleged intention of the company to plug into town lots. The case is an important one, involving heavy interests. Mr. Dickey and W. J. Brophy, and other Copper Queen magnates are here as witnesses. The defendant company is represented by Elwood and Ross.

Deputy clerk of the district court Earl S. Curtis yesterday signed the order for the removal of J. B. Goodwin from the state prison at Florence to the county jail in Pinal county. This is in accordance with an order from the department in Washington which desires that Goodwin be taken to a place of safety.

It was at first intended to remove the prisoner to the jail at Tucson, but Marshal Overlock prefers the bastille at Prescott as being the "safest" in the state.

TAFT IS WINNER OF RENOMINATION

Roosevelt Absolutely Defeated For a Third Term.

BAY STATE TELLS TALE.

Former President Needs 311 Delegates to Win, and Only 310 Remain to Be Elected—Tables Tell the Story—The States in Which Delegates Are Yet to Be Chosen.

Theodore Roosevelt has already lost all chance of renomination for a third term by the Republican national convention at Chicago in June. On Saturday night, May 4, he needed 311 delegates to control the convention, and on that day only 210 delegates remained to be chosen. The 744 delegates already elected are instructed for or pledged to President Taft, Colonel Roosevelt and Senators La Follette and Cummins, and of this number President Taft has almost two-thirds for his renomination.

The plain defeat of Colonel Roosevelt in Massachusetts practically took him out of the race, and the action of the Thirteenth Missouri district in sending to Chicago delegates pledged to Taft proved his ultimate undoing. In Massachusetts the contest was fought under a presidential preference primary law which had Mr. Roosevelt's complete approval. The issues raised were issues squarely between President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt themselves, and the vote showed this result:

President Taft carried the presidential preference primary by 4,000 plurality and had an actual majority over both Colonel Roosevelt and Senator La Follette.

The president carried nine of the fourteen congressional districts in the state.

The Taft alternate ticket was elected by a plurality as large as the president's on the preference vote.

The Taft delegate ticket was defeated through a technical error on the part of the voters, who were confused by the presence of an independent Taft candidate on the ticket. This fact caused more than 18,000 voters to vote for nine instead of eight Taft delegates at large, although invalidating their ballots, thereby their preference was plainly shown. In recognition of this fact Colonel Roosevelt himself has waived his claim to these delegates.

The public is advised to start early for the grounds in view of the starting advance sale of tickets already effected. Immediately after the Grand street parade it would be wise to secure your seat location. The management will reserve the grandstand exclusively for ladies and the privilege of the field will be extended to all so long as the game is not encroached upon.

All tickets are 50c. While the game will not start until four o'clock there will be numerous humorous stunts actively engaged in for over an hour preceding. So come early and avoid the rush.



TROOPS COMING HOME

WASHINGTON, May 15.—An army transport sailed from Manila today with the second cavalry and the Nineteenth infantry on board. Instead of waiting until Sept. 15 to complete the withdrawal of infantry and cavalry regiments from the Philippines, as originally proposed under the reorganization plans, the last of these coming home will be embarked a month from today, when the Sixth and Ninth infantry will sail from Manila.

HOUSTON SHIP CANAL

GALVESTON, Texas, May 15.—Major Earl I. Provo, United States engineer for the Galveston district, today opened bids for the dredging of the Houston ship canal, to extend from deep water in Galveston Bay to the turning basin in Buffalo Bayou, below Harrisburg. The improvement, it is estimated, will cost \$2,500,000, half of this to be provided by the Harris county navigation district and the other half by the federal government. The contractor will be required to complete the work in three and a half years. The proposed

WASHINGTON FOR TAFT

SPRINGFIELD, Wash., May 15.—Taft forces are in control of the republican state convention of Washington, which was convened here today. The state committee has endorsed the president by a vote of 15 to 12.

TAFT MEN CLAIM UTAH

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, May 15.—Provo is the gathering place of Utah republicans today for the purpose of choosing a delegation to the national convention. The state committee is almost solid for Taft and the indications are that the president will get all of Utah's delegates to Chicago.

U. P. MISSION BOARD

SPOKANE, Wash., May 15.—General officers and delegates from every state of the union in which the denomination is represented are in attendance here today by the Home

Mission board of the United Presbyterian church. The sessions will continue until next Wednesday, when the general assembly of the denomination convenes in Seattle. This is the first time the National United Presbyterian conventions have been held in the northwest since 1894.

LAKE MOHONK, N. Y., May 15.—With distinguished leaders in the peace cause from all over this country and Canada present, the eighteenth annual conference on International Arbitration was opened here today.

BAPTISTS HOLD SESSIONS

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 15.—Meeting in fifty-seventh annual session, the Southern Baptist convention was opened in the Oklahoma metropolis today, with delegations representing 25,000 churches and 2,500,000 members. Reports show that the white Baptists of the south have spent \$10,500,000 for religious work in the past year. Efforts will be made at the convention to raise large church building and foreign

mission funds, the latter in celebration of the centennial of Adoniram Judson, the noted Baptist foreign mission pioneer.
