

PUMPING PLANT NEAR MARICOPA

Successful Test of the Water Supply for the Desert Reclamation Undertaking of R. P. Davie and Associates.

Not long ago The Republican recited at some length the details of a project undertaken for the reclamation by pumped water, of a tract of 12,500 acres of desert land just east of Maricopa.

The superintendant is used for the reason that the requirement was the raising of 540 gallons of water per minute from the well, and the showing made was the full capacity of the pump, 850 gallons per minute.

It is planned now to equip the well with a 1,200 gallon pump and it is believed also that with continuous pumping the draw down will be even less as it will keep the hole cleaned out and the flow clear, while the supply seems almost inexhaustible.

The next few years will certainly witness the reclamation of many such desert areas that have all the needs of the finest farming country in the world, except the water supply and that exists but a few feet below the surface.

Engines are now obtainable that may be operated with but a small part of the fuel required a few years ago, and that return also a much greater volume of power for a like amount of fuel used.

ucky did not wish to place James' name before the committee. He said he had talked with James and had been assured that he was not a candidate.

Robert Ewing, committeeman from Louisiana and a Wilson supporter, placed James' name before the committee. Edward Goltra of Missouri, a Clark man, explained that he voted for James because he was supporting Clark.

The debate over the temporary chairmanship was not prolonged. Representative Talbot of Maryland, a member of the committee, severely criticized Bryan and declared that the Nebraska had assumed the role of dictator of the democratic party.

Senator Newlands of Nevada, sitting in the committee with the proxy of Committeeman Sunderland, defended Bryan. The senator said he did not yield to the dictation of any one man but he did not regard Bryan as a dictator but as a representative of the progressive principles endorsed by the party.

At the conclusion of the vote on temporary chairman, the committee took up the delegate contests. Subcommittees were appointed to take up the various contests, the largest subcommittee taking care of the contestants from Illinois headed by Mayor Harrison of Chicago.

MAY PLACATE NEBRASKAN.

He Will be Chairman of Committee on Resolutions.

BALTIMORE, June 24.—Bryan will probably be the chairman of the committee on resolutions. He will be the representative of his state in that committee and his position in the party is such that the place is conceded to him by common consent.

The delegates were too much occupied today by the temporary chairmanship to give close attention to the resolutions but in so far as there was any expression on the subject it indicated harmony. Representatives of some of the eastern states express apprehension and say there will be an effort to force the approval of the initiative, referendum and recall and if there is, it will be opposed.

There will be planks pledging the party to income tax legislation, the election of senators by a direct vote and primary elections. The protective tariff will be held responsible for the trusts and the high cost of living and there will be a declaration for a rapid revision downward.


TEXAS FOR BRYAN.
