

**EXCURSION TO BISBEE**—Special rates to Bisbee will be in effect next Friday night when the degree train of the D. O. K. K. under the direction of Royal Vizer, B. E. Marks and Imperial Navab C. W. Cisney, goes to that city to hold a ceremonial session. Numerous other votaries will accompany the train and the general public can get in on the rates if it is so inclined. A class of about fifty novitiates has been recruited from the Pythian lodges of Bisbee, Douglas and Cananea, and the roundup is expected to be spectacular and interesting.

**TO THE OLD HOME**—Chas. R. Bernetke, an Arizona writer, left last night over the S. P. by way of New Orleans for his former home in Seymour and Appleton, Wis. He is going to stop at St. Louis and Chicago on business, and upon his return trip expects to sojourn awhile at Hot Springs, Ark., and also at Pawlerton, Texas, where his brother is pastor of the Evangelical church. While east, Mr. Bernetke is going to visit some former Phoenix winter visitors, whose homes are in Iron Mountain, Mich., returning again in the fall.

**THE SUPERVISORS**—The board of supervisors yesterday in addition to the transaction of routine business attended to two other matters. It declared open a road running from the southern boundary of Tempe to the base line, a distance of two miles and a half. Though this is already a very good road and has been used for a generation, until yesterday it was not a county road. It is now to be provided for better sanitary arrangements in the county jail. It is not generally known no precautions had been taken until now to prevent the flooding of the jail with sewer gas. It is stated that there is not a trap in the jail section of the building. The plumbing system is to be entirely remodeled and made more modern.

**MARTINEZ CAPTURED**—According to a telegram received yesterday by Governor Hunt David Martinez, a Mexican charged with having murdered his wife at their home in Cochise county, June 12, has been captured and is now in jail at Agua Prieta. It was believed at the time that Martinez had fled to the state of Sonora, as bloodhounds which had been used in an attempt to run down the fugitive, followed the trail for a considerable distance in the direction of the international boundary. Following the homicide and the escape of the suspected man Governor Hunt offered a reward of \$200 for his apprehension but as no details have yet been received regarding his arrest it is not yet known by whom the money will be claimed. It is expected that it will be known today whether the prisoner will fight extradition and if he does he will be lodged in the jail at Tombstone within a short time.

**NO FREE BOOKS FOR THIS YEAR**

Provisions of New Text Book Law Cannot Will Be Applied to Public Action Until 1913. Board Postpones Action.

At a meeting of the board of education June 22, 1912, the following resolution was adopted:  
 Owing to the fact that the free text book act does not become effective until August 18, 1912, and that prior to that date the board of education is unable to open competitive bids for prices on the school books, or to do any other definite or binding work relative to the purchase of text books, and whereas the majority of the public schools begin the middle of September and some as early as the last week in July, and whereas under the circumstances the schools would be without text books for several weeks after the opening of the term, and whereas the legislature found it impossible to make this, the free text book act, an emergency act, and whereas the attorney general has advised that it is within the power of this board to postpone this matter, therefore, be it resolved that no further work on the part of the board to place free text books in the schools this year be attempted.

When the bill was pending in the legislature it aroused a great deal of opposition at Ray and Hayden, particularly, the hardest kind of a fight was made against it and the legislature was flooded with protests against its passage, these protests being signed by thousands of both Mexicans and Americans. The statement was made at the time by several managers and superintendents of mines that the enactment into law of such a measure would so badly cripple the mining business in Arizona that some of the mines would have to be closed.

It is plainly understood that the bill is partly a political character. The Spanish speaking residents are largely republicans and this measure, if enacted into law, is designed to take care of any Mexicans who do not happen to be disfranchised by the so-called educational clause in the primary and election laws.

Furthermore, the bill is sanctioned by the Western Federation of Miners, whose favor the democrats have consistently cultivated in all legislative matters having to do with labor.
