NEW CITY WELL DOWN 415 FEET

At That Depth Drilling Tools Encounter Granite Formation and Work Stops Pending Chemical Analysis of Water.

Impeded by encountering a solid granite formation the drilling of the new well at the city water pumping plant has been stopped, a depth of 415 feet having been reached. But notwithstanding the temporary halt in the work, Superintendent V. A. Thompson of the city water department is not at all discouraged, for there is a possibility that he has already secured the quality of water for which he has been seeking. He is having an analysis made of the water flowing from the new well and until he has received a report from the chemist in Los Angeles, whose services have been secured, his plans for the future are up in the air.

At the depth to which the new well has gone, a different flow of water has been encountered. This is indicated by the fact that the water stands 24 inches higher in the casing of this well than in any of the other city wells. This indicates strength of pressure and the probability that a new vein of water has been found.

In this connection it is announced that notwithstanding the fact that the tools are in almost solid granite, it will be possible to go through this formation if necessary. Should it be found that the new supply of water is no better than that now being supplied the city it is likely that the well will be started drilling again, and while it will not be possible to drive a 16-inch casing in the hole, as has been done to within 75 feet of

the bottom of the new well, it would be possible to employ a 12 to 14-inch casing with satisfactory results. Non-expert tests of the water obtainable from the new well have given rise to a hope, if not a belief, that water more free of organic salts than that now used by the city is present. It will, however, require the report of the chemist to definitely determine this. In the meantime the Arizona Eastern has contracted with the city for a four-inch water service pipe, which has been installed. The railroad has announced that unless the city is able to supply water such as it can use in its engine boilers without the use of a chemical boiler compound it will install its own plant about six miles northwest of the city and pipe water of its own direct to the new shops. But City Superintendent Thompson believes he will be able to supply the quality of water required, thereby assuring the city of additional revenue and removing the necessity of the construction of such a plant by the railroad company.

Will Continue Regular Sessions Irrespective of New Year's Day.
