**MOORE WILL ENFORCE
SWEEPING ORDINANCE**

Chief of Police Announces New Law
of City is Effective.

Appropos of the announcement of Street Commissioner Griggs Carr that he is determined to put an end to the dust nuisance at the risk of being criticized for flooding the street gutters in the day time. Chief of Police A. J. Moore announced yesterday that he will see that the sidewalk sweeping ordinance adopted by the city council on October 25, 1912, is strictly enforced. While the ordinance in question was but recently made a city regulation, it has practically been a dead letter owing to the fact that there was little use of endeavoring to correct a lesser evil while a greater one existed.

At the last meeting of the city council Chief Moore asked for instructions as to the full import of the ordinance and then assured the city fathers that hereafter he would see that it was enforced to the letter.

The ordinance provides that it shall be a misdemeanor to sweep any dirt, debris, refuse, old paper or garbage from stores upon a sidewalk; or into a gutter, unless the person so doing shall at once remove the dirt to a suitable receptacle which shall have been approved by the street commissioner.

There is nothing about the ordinance which specifies at what hours of the day the sweeping may be done. The purpose of the ordinance is to regulate as nearly as possible the dust nuisance as well as to prevent the accumulation of dirt and debris in the street gutters.

**DUDLEY LEWIS RANCH
BOUGHT BY L. C. SLOAN**

One of the Old-Time Improved Farm Holdings Changes Hands During Past Week.

Before he came to Arizona, Mr. Sloan owned property at Rocky Ford, but after a visit here, decided to sell his Colorado property and locate in the Salt River valley.

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**FEW LYNCHINGS
IN PAST YEAR**

Only Fifty-Two Killings of
This Order Are Recorded
as Compared With Much
Greater Number in Other
Years

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 4.—Only fifty-two lynchings, known to be such by two doubtless, occurred in the United States in the year just closed. In previous years the number has been much larger, 190 having been recorded in 1894 and 170 in the year following. The past ten years the number has been steadily decreasing. Only one year, 1907, produced fewer lynchings than 1912.

In some of the southern states there were fewer lynchings in 1912 than in almost any previous year. The decrease is attributed largely to the efforts made by governors and prominent citizens to prevent mob violence. Many of the governors have acted promptly and energetically to prevent lynchings, and the declared policy of giving the free opportunity for the punishment of all alleged offenders, white or black.

Again, as in the record of former years, more lynchings occurred in Georgia than in any other state. Louisiana and Florida come next in the list. South Carolina, whose governor has gone on record as opposed to lynchings in certain cases, had six cases of summary execution this year as against only one in the year 1911. Kentucky, with eight lynchings in 1911, had a clean state this year. Oklahoma is another state with a clean record for the past twelve months. The figures for Texas, Tennessee, Florida and Arkansas show fewer lynchings than in 1911. In Mississippi, Alabama and Louisiana the number slightly exceeded that of last year.

The states outside of the south where lynchings occurred in 1912 were West Virginia, Wyoming, Montana, North Dakota and California. By states the record is as follows: Georgia, 14; Louisiana, 8; South Carolina, 6; Florida, 5; Alabama, 4; Arkansas, 3; Texas, 2; Mississippi, 2; Tennessee, 1; Wyoming, 1; West Virginia, 1; Montana, 1; California, 1; and North Dakota, 1.

In the fifty-two lynchings the victims of all but two were negroes. Three negroes were included in the list. Alleged crimes against women or girls and the murder of white persons accounted for practically all the cases.

A singular feature is found in the lynching of the two white men, both of which occurred in the far south. In each case the victim was accused of murder. In the town of Joppa, a short

distance from Rosebur, Mo., Harry Heffner, alleged slayer of Mrs. William Merrill, was taken from the county jail by a crowd of masked men and hanged, despite the efforts of the sheriff and his deputy. The second lynching occurred at Steele, N. D., where George Baker, charged with the murder of his wife and father-in-law, was taken from the jail and hanged by a mob. The lynching was the first recorded in North Dakota in more than a decade.

The lynching in Wyoming was one of the most sensational of the year. Frank Wigfall, a negro who confessed to having made a criminal attack on Mrs. Esther Higgins, an aged woman known as the "prisoners' friend", was lynched by the convicts of the state penitentiary at Rawlins.

In the West Virginia lynching the victim was Walter Johnson, a negro accused of assaulting a young white girl in Mercer county.

California's one lynching was out of the ordinary. It occurred on the desert, some thirty miles from the town of Mojave. The victim was an unknown negro accused of having attacked a six-year-old child. He was hanged by men alleged to be employed on the Los Angeles aqueduct.

The three negroes who fell victims to mob violence were Ann Boston, who murdered the wife of a planter at Pinehurst, Ga.; Mary Jackson, who was lynched in Parola county, Texas, for alleged complicity in the murder of a white man, and an unknown negro, who, together with three negroes, was hanged by a mob in Harris county, Georgia, for the murder of a farmer.

Tyler, Texas, furnished the only instance of the year where the victim was burned at the stake. On May 25, Dan Davis, a negro who had confessed to a criminal attack on a young white woman, was burned at the stake in one of the main streets of Tyler in the presence of a crowd of two thousand persons.

The foregoing record does not comprise cases of plain murder or cases where the victim was killed by a posse while resisting capture.

BOOSTING BUSINESS.
Richmond is in the boosting business, like all American cities. The latest wrinkle in the former capital of the confederacy is to have the chamber of commerce engineer a "Christmas season return home dinner" for the returning men of color. The eloquence attending the proposition refers to them as our local "knights of the grip." Too many folks are spending nights with the grip, however, to make that designation altogether felicitous.—Springfield Republican.
