JONES SUES FOR \$20,000

Civil Action for Libel Filed in Superior Court by Corporation Commissioner Against the Owners of the Arizona Democrat

In the opinion of Corporation Commissioner Jones, the remarks which the Arizona Democrat have been making about his official conduct from time to time is worth \$20,000 of the Democrat's money and following this idea up, Messrs. Hawkins and Hawkins, acting for Mr. Jones, filed a suit in Superior Court yesterday against John O. Dunbar, W. T. Webb, George A. Olney, E. A. Sawyer and Mark Dunbar, owners of the Democrat, asking for judgment in that amount.

The complaint recites the fact that the plaintiff was elected to the office of corporation commissioner in 1911, that on April 10 of this year Mr. Jones, the plaintiff, was assailed in the following terms: "E. A. Jones returned from a month's vacation and travel at the state's expense just in time to publish a 'dissenting' opinion of the corporation commission. If the gentleman would remain in Arizona a few days each month, it would not only give the state treasurer a rest, but would permit him to ascertain what is being done in Arizona by the commission he presumes to adorn."

This is interpreted by the plaintiff to allege that he had been neglecting his office duties and that he had been traveling on private business or pleasure at the expense of the state. He thinks that that was the understanding by the public of the language of the article and that the writer meant it to be so understood. The consequent damage is alleged to be \$5,000, for which amount the plaintiff asks, and for the further sum of \$5,000 exemplary damages, to the end that the offense will not be repeated by the defendants and that others may be deterred.

Mr. Dunbar is alleged to have written the foregoing and it is charged in the complaint that it was done with the full knowledge and consent of the other defendants. That charge is made on the ground that none of them intervened to prevent subsequent attacks upon the plaintiff, another of which, as follows, is made the basis of a second cause of action: "Commissioner Jones was a strong witness yesterday before the interstate commerce commission for the whisky and beer men of Arizona. It was noticeable, however, that Mr. Jones failed to

take the stand when the people were demanding a reduction of flour rates. Who cares how high the freight rate is on whisky and beer? What the people of Arizona want is a reduction on the necessities of life, flour, sugar, coffee, oil, etc., and not on whisky. Mr. Jones did not shine to any particular advantage in the role of a corporation commissioner of this state, acting as an attorney for the whisky trust."

This, as well as the former publication, is declared to be false, malicious and unprivileged and for this, as for the former publication, \$5,000 is asked for actual damages and \$5,000 for exemplary damages.

The papers were served upon the defendants yesterday morning and later it was announced that they would be represented by Reese M. Lang and George J. Stoneman.


Mabelle Fonda and Co., the wizards of motion, do about the fanciest lot of

The movies were more than usually interesting last evening too and will be repeated tonight.




