ALL ATHLETICS DAY AT TEMPE NORMAL

Interscholastic Tournament of Sports Promises Some Excellent Contests

The entire day will be devoted to athletics at the Tempe Normal school, today beginning promptly at 9:30. The main event of the day is the annual tennis tournament of the institution in which all the schools of the valley which have been invited to participate as outsiders. The tennis events in order to complete the tournament in one day must start early and for this purpose all is in readiness for the first matches to be called at nine o'clock. The events of the tournament will consist of two houses, one for the bona fide school students of the valley schools and state and the second, possibly more interesting, for all comers a free for all contest in which any person in the state can take part and in which a number of very fast competitors are now entered.

The school tournament will be conducted first and will consist of gentlemen's singles, ladies' singles, gentlemen's doubles, ladies' doubles. So far the Normal, Phoenix High, the Indian School and possibly Mesa and Tempe are entered and the competition promises to be of the highest class. The winners in these events will be presented with suitable tokens and will be shown a good time for the day. The second division will consist of the same events as the first but this will call for faster company. A number of outsiders, some from Phoenix, others from the Evans School and a few local men are all ready arrayed and the winner will have to play real tennis.

It is the aim of the management to furnish a meal at the noon hour to all out of town contestants and the same can be obtained at the dining hall thus avoiding the delay attendant upon lunch recess.

At three o'clock, immediately following the completion of the tournament, a ball game will be called on the Normal grounds. The contending teams will be the Normal nine and the local Tempe Bears. While the lineup may seem one-sided, the game will probably be one of the very best played here this season. These teams met in a practice game on Thursday afternoon and played a 3-0 game with no score up to the last of the eighth.

A general admission of 35 cents will be charged for the day or 25 cents for the afternoon.


