UNITED STATES RAILWAY MAKER

First Railroad Ever Built on American Soil Now Possible in Arizona by Decision of Judge W. H. Sawtelle

Uncle Sam will now proceed to build his very first American railroad in the state of Arizona, county of Yuma—as a result of a decision handed down by Federal Judge Sawtelle yesterday, sustaining the district attorney's application for an order of right of way over certain county and private lands.

The contest was raised by the county, represented by Attorney Ingraham, and Althea and Eliza Dufane, owners of property.

The road proposed to be built is 29 miles long, and lies along the levee above the Colorado river to the south of Yuma. The purpose of the road is to make it easy to rip rap the levee, and after its primary purpose is fulfilled, it will be used as a common carrier of supplies. The twenty miles will be completed inside of thirty days. The only other United States owned road is in Panama.

Assistant United States Attorney Wiley Jones presented the government's side of the case.
