COTTON MEETINGS—Commissioner Waterhouse of Tempe is anxious to start the co-operation business among the cotton planters. He has begun the agitation of a meeting of cotton men of the valley. The board of trade here has named Frank Lane, Vernon L. Cook, Sid Henry, a committee to cooperate with Walter Swingle, the government expert on purification of breeds and cotton marketing.

HAD A GUN—D. D. Andrews was arrested last evening on Central avenue by Officer McGrath, who discovered that Andrews was "toting" a gun. Andrews explained that he had been held up and robbed of thirty dollars a few nights previously and that he had subsequently decided to protect himself against further outrages of the sort. He deposited fifty dollars as surety for his appearance in court this afternoon.

chief for several years in an able manner and has raised the standard of the department, despite conditions before which he might well have faltered. He is an able fire fighter and a competent executive. He is progressive and as the head of the department of the immediate future will have added duties and increased scope.

Dodge for several years was in the employ of the General Electric Company and went through the various departments of the big work in Schenectady, N. Y., learning the intricacies of the manufacture of electrical appliances. He has installed electric lighting plants in scores of big cities and had been selected to direct the construction and installation of the big electrical plant at Clarkdale, the terminus of the new branch of the Santa Fe where the big Clark smelter is now rising. His appointment, effective several days ago is expected to result in the introduction of the most modern ideas with regard to the installation of electric wiring in Phoenix. As a starter he succeeded last evening in securing the adoption of a resolution requiring all wires for electric lighting and power to be installed in metal conduits, with metal outlets and junction boxes. This refers to the downtown district included between Third street and Third avenue and Monroe and Madison streets.

Joseph Monahan, according to report made by Commissioner Cape, is willing to go ahead with the improvements to the park tract donated by him to the city and guarantee he will have it done at about one-fourth of what it is expected it would cost the city. This matter was referred to the city manager and the city attorney, James Hellman asked that sidewalks be laid to Eastlake Park and crossing constructed at the same time. This matter, brought to the attention of the commission in a communication, was laid on the table.

A letter was read from Congressman Hayden sent in response to a telegram sent by City Clerk Thomas protesting against the division of the land office, stating he believed that Tucson would ultimately have an office and that he understood there was need of such an office.

The request of former City Marshal Moore for a release from his bond, was refused upon the ground that there can be no liability attached to the bond for acts subsequent to its retirement, that the premium is no longer payable and that the protection to the city lies in the liability that attaches to the bond for acts omitted or omitted during the term of the office of the official furnishing the bond.

The purpose of the meeting it was stated, was to afford opportunity for the filing of such objections but none of those in the interposed any argument for or against the assessment as it has been fixed.

Before adjournment Mayor Young informed the commissioners they had been invited to dine with the board of trade at noon today. And then the mayor, the commissioners and the city officials present accepted the invitation of Manager Cronson of the Regalia theater to be his guests for an hour and witness his evening program.

A KICK FROM SOUTH CENTER—The residents of South Center avenue are complaining that the irrigation ditches are strangers to water and the southgoing boulevard is ignorant of the alleviating services of the sprinkling cart. W. J. Milsaps who lives down there in speaking of the matter yesterday said, "We will be mighty glad down our way when we see the sprinkling wagon making daily trips over the street, and when the ditches carry enough water and often enough for us to water our trees and lawns and keep them green."

Her work showed careful and excellent training and was most pleasing. She possesses a good singing tone and excellent technique. She played the Rondo Capriccioso in commendable fashion and Herlihy's "Berceuse" was beautifully done. The young lady has a charming personality which she will find a great asset in her work and her simplicity and unaffectedness was most pleasing.

Miss Madge Sanders was the accompanist and as is always the case, her work was exceptionally good.
