WORLD'S INTEREST IN AEROPLANE WARFARE

Pictures of Two Prominent Aircraft Since Destroyed, at Savoy Tonight

With the interest of all the nations of the world centered on the great conflict raging in Europe, the prominent part played by the several types of air craft in the struggle is a matter of history.

Both France and Germany from the very day of the first successful heavier than air machine have bent every effort to be first in the conquest of the air. The French turned more to the plane type with the mono-planes, while the Germans lent their aid to the great cigar-shaped craft of their countryman Count Zeppelin, the dirigibles.

The latter type, huge gas bags capable of carrying a score of men and weapons were thought by the Germans to be almost invincible, but the first of the craft to encounter the tiny monoplane of Roland G. Garros, the great French aviator, met its fate when the pilot of the French machine drove his Blériot through the bag sending it and its load of human freight to earth a crumpled mass of broken strings and sticks.

At the Arizona theatre tonight there will be shown as an added feature every type of flying craft ever designed, from the great Zeppelin to the tiny Demoiselle. Roland G. Garros the brave Frenchman will be shown in several countries before the breaking out of war, and the great big he sent to its destruction will be seen flying over the harbor of Kiel.

It will be the first peep at the splendid array of flying craft used by the two nations foremost in the titanic struggle, and should prove an added feature of interest.

ORDINANCE NO. 21 AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE BUSINESS OF PAWN BROKERS, SECOND-HAND DEALERS, JUNK DEALERS AND JUNK COLLECTORS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PHOENIX, as follows:

Sec. 1. For the purposes of this ordinance a "pawnbroker" is defined to be a person, firm, association or corporation engaged in conducting, managing or carrying on the business of pawnbroking, or the business of loaning money for himself, or for any other person, firm, association or corporation, receiving as security for the repayment thereof pawns or pledges of personal property, or the business of purchasing personal property and reselling or agreeing to resell such articles to vendors, their personal representatives, or their assignees, at prices agreed upon at or before the time of such purchase, whether such business be the principal or sole business so carried on, managed or conducted, or be merely incidental to, in connection with or a branch or department of some other business or businesses.

A "pawnshop" is defined to be any room, store or place in which such business is engaged in, carried on or conducted.

For the purposes of this ordinance, a "second-hand dealer" is defined to be a person, firm, association or corporation engaged in, conducting, managing or carrying on the business of buying, selling or otherwise dealing in second-hand goods, wares or merchandise or articles, whether such business be the principal or sole business so carried on, managed or conducted, or be merely incidental to, in connection with or a branch or department of some other business or businesses.

For the purposes of this ordinance, a "junk dealer" is defined to be a person, firm, association or corporation engaged in, conducting, managing or carrying on the business of buying, selling or otherwise dealing in junk, or articles received on deposit, in pawn or pledge, or by purchase.

Such report shall show the hour of the day and the date when each article was received on deposit, in pawn or pledge, or by purchase, and the true name and address, as nearly as the same is known to, or can be ascertained by, such pawnbroker, junk dealer or junk collector, within the City of Phoenix, to fail, neglect or refuse to make out and deliver to the Chief of Police, within twenty-four hours after the receipt thereof, a full true and complete report of all goods, wares, merchandise or articles received on deposit, in pawn or pledge, or by purchase.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any second-hand dealer, junk dealer or junk collector, or any employee or agent of any second-hand dealer, junk dealer or junk collector, within the City of Phoenix, to fail, neglect or refuse to make out and deliver to the Chief of Police, within one week after the receipt thereof, a full true and complete report of all goods, wares, merchandise or articles received on deposit, in pawn or pledge, or by purchase.

Sec. 3. It shall be unlawful for any pawnbroker, second-hand dealer, junk dealer or junk collector, or any employee or agent of any pawnbroker, second-hand dealer, junk dealer or junk collector, within the City of Phoenix, to fail, neglect or refuse to make out and deliver to the Chief of Police, within one week after the receipt thereof, a full true and complete report of all goods, wares, merchandise or articles received on deposit, in pawn or pledge, or by purchase.

Sec. 4. All reports required by the provisions of this ordinance to be made out and delivered to the Chief of Police, shall be written or printed entirely in the English language, in a clear and legible manner.

Sec. 5. It shall be unlawful for any pawnbroker, second-hand dealer, junk dealer or junk collector, or any employee or agent of any pawnbroker, second-hand dealer, junk dealer or junk collector, within the City of Phoenix, to fail, neglect or refuse to make out and deliver to the Chief of Police, within one week after the receipt thereof, a full true and complete report of all goods, wares, merchandise or articles received on deposit, in pawn or pledge, or by purchase.

Sec. 6. Each failure, neglect or refusal to make out and deliver to the Chief of Police the report in this ordinance required to be so made out and delivered, within the time herein required, and each defacement, alteration, change, destruction, parting with, concealment, gift, sale or disposition of any goods, wares, merchandise or article before or until one week after the making out and delivery of such report shall constitute a violation of this ordinance.

Every person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by a court of competent jurisdiction, shall be punished by a fine of not more than two hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail for a term of not more than two hundred days, or both such fine and imprisonment, and the license of any pawnbroker, second-hand dealer, junk dealer or junk collector may be summarily revoked by the Commission for any violation of the provisions of this ordinance by such pawnbroker, second-hand dealer, junk dealer or junk collector, his, their or its employees or agents and upon any such revocation of license, all fees or taxes thereon paid on account of such license shall be forfeited to the city.

Sec. 7. WHEREAS, the immediate operation of the provisions of this ordinance is necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Commission and approval by the Mayor, and a hereby exempted from the provisions of the City Charter.

PASSED by the Commission of the City of Phoenix, this 12th day of September, 1914.

Sec. 8. Each failure, neglect or refusal to make out and deliver to the Chief of Police the report in this ordinance required to be so made out and delivered, within the time herein required, and each defacement, alteration, change, destruction, parting with, concealment, gift, sale or disposition of any goods, wares, merchandise or article before or until one week after the making out and delivery of such report shall constitute a violation of this ordinance.

Sec. 9. Every person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by a court of competent jurisdiction, shall be punished by a fine of not more than two hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail for a term of not more than two hundred days, or both such fine and imprisonment, and the license of any pawnbroker, second-hand dealer, junk dealer or junk collector may be summarily revoked by the Commission for any violation of the provisions of this ordinance by such pawnbroker, second-hand dealer, junk dealer or junk collector, his, their or its employees or agents and upon any such revocation of license, all fees or taxes thereon paid on account of such license shall be forfeited to the city.
