ORDINANCE NO. 29.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 2 OF ORDINANCE NO. 28 (NEW SERIES) OF THE CITY OF PHOENIX

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PHOENIX as follows:

Sec. 1. That Section 2 of Ordinance No. 28 (New Series) of the City of Phoenix be amended to read as follows:

"Each such person, firm, association or corporation owning, maintaining or operating one or more motor hacks, motor coaches, motor carriages, motor omnibuses or other motor vehicles shall also, before license is issued under this ordinance, give to the City a bond, with good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the City Manager, in a sum amounting to One Thousand Dollars, which said bond shall be conditioned that, if license is issued to the said applicant to own, maintain and operate such motor hacks, motor coaches, motor carriages, motor omnibuses and motor vehicles for hire, the said applicant shall well and truly observe, obey and perform all and singular the duties, requirements, restrictions and obligations which are or may be imposed upon or required of him in the management and operation thereof by the City Charter or by ordinance or resolution of the Commission, and conditioned further that the said applicant will pay any final judgment or judgments which may be recovered against him in any court of competent jurisdiction by reason of any injury or damage sustained or suffered by any person or by through the fault or negligence of the applicant, his servants and employees, in the management and operation thereof, and which said bond may be sued upon by any such judgment creditor. And whenever suit be brought upon such bond by any such judgment creditor, additional bond shall be given by such person, firm, association or corporation, in an amount equal to the amount of such unsatisfied judgment, up to \$1000.00.

GERMANS ON RETREAT

PETROGRAD, Nov. 4.—A Russian general staff official report says: "A sudden change was noted since yesterday on the East Prussian front where the enemy, recently on the defensive nearly everywhere, has begun to retreat at certain points. This retreat was precipitated on the enemy's left wing which was vigorously thrown back toward Biala and Lyck. Our troops took Bakalajew capturing a German company and supplies. On the left bank of the Vistula the Germans continue their precipitate retreat toward the frontier. Their rear guards were dislodged from Kolo and Przebodorz yesterday and we drove back the Austrians toward Kielco which have occupied, taking 600 prisoners and machine guns. We also won a decisive victory over the Austrians along the entire front from Kielco to Sandomir. The enemy retreated hurriedly. We took Sandomir which is a strategic point.

Porte Recalls Them

CONSTANTINOPLE.—The Porte has recalled the Turkish ambassadors to France and Great Britain, the charge d'affaires at Petrograd and the minister to Serbia.

Gets His Passports

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The foreign office today handed passports to the Turkish Ambassador Tewfik Pasha, who will leave London tomorrow.

Destroyed by Mine

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 4.—A large German trawler was destroyed by a mine south of the Danish island of Langeland in the great belt. The crew's fate is unknown.

Japanese Fleet

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 4.—A steam collier arriving at Valparaiso, reports that eight Japanese warships are at Easter Island, the Chilean possession in the Pacific, 2300 miles west of the Chilean coast.

Juddah Bombarded

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The British cruiser Minerva has bombarded the Arabian town of Jeddah (Juddah) on the Red Sea.

No Change

PARIS, Nov. 4.—Tonight's official report says: "There are no important modifications to report. In the north we have made slight progress toward Messines. To the east the artillery duels at several points of the front occurred without any great results notably west of Lens between the Somme and Ancre in Argonne and in the forest of Apremont."

No Insane Dashes Yet

TOKIO, Nov. 4.—The Round Robin

written in blood and signed by 500 bluejackets requesting permission to dash into the bay and capture Meyer Waldeck, the German governor of Kiao Chow has been refused by the officers of the Japanese fleet. A pall of smoke envelopes Tsing Tau. The sailors are driving their last mines while the Austrian cruiser Kaiserin Elizabeth shells them continuously. The soldiers on the Shan Tung railway complain they were attacked by Chinese civilians.

Naval Battle off England

LONDON, Nov. 4.—That four German dreadnaughts and four German cruisers took part in yesterday's engagement off the coast of England, was confirmed by a crew of the steam drifter Garrigill. According to the skipper of the drifter, the German ships appeared through the mist about sixteen miles east and northeast of Lowestoft at seven in the morning. The firing at the British cruiser Halsey lasted fifteen minutes. The skipper also says two British submarines, in addition to D-5, which was sunk by striking a mine, were pursued by the Germans.

Admiralty Statement

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The admiralty has issued a statement in which it is said it received from German sources the details of the naval engagement off the Chilean coast in which the British cruiser Monmouth was sunk and the cruiser Good Hope severely damaged. The statement says the admiralty has no confirmation of the report.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The admiralty announces that one officer and twenty men were lost in the sinking of the British submarine D-5 by a German mine in the North Sea yesterday.

RUBBER TIRES ON STREET CARS


One of the speakers at the recent session of the Tramways Association of Great Britain in Newcastle suggested the introduction of rubber or some other silent material for tires on street cars.

The speaker contended that a properly designed tire for street cars would exceed the life of tires on motor buses and motor wagons, on which a life of twenty thousand miles and over was common; that the wear and tear on the rails would be reduced; that the cost of maintenance would be largely eliminated, and that the corrugation problem would be solved.

The question of doing away with noise and vibration, it was contended, was a strong argument in favor of rubber tires. A higher rate of speed could also be attained, which the speaker placed at twenty miles an hour.—Consular Report.
