ing out hose that had been used at a fire.

The second floor would embrace an ample dormitory, rooms for the chief and captain, a large lounge room, and toilets and modern shower baths. Manager Parish believes that it may be possible to actually begin the work of construction within a very few weeks.

As stated in The Republican a short time ago, Manager Parish expects within a short time to advertise for bids for the purchase of additional fire apparatus. This will include a modern Graham high pressure auto fire pump and an aerial truck. The former he expects will cost in the neighborhood of \$2,000 and the latter approximately \$12,000. He has available from the bond issue voted several months ago for fire improvement purposes approximately \$45,000. This he believes will be adequate not only for meeting the expense the construction of the proposed new central fire station and the pump and truck but for the further improvement of the fire-alarm system by the installation of a sufficient number of new boxes and the installation of an adequate alarm registering system.

In addition to these improvements, Manager Parish also intends to begin within a short time the construction of a new system of fire pressure mains, to cost approximately \$5,000, such as was recommended by Fire Chief Holmgren of San Diego who was brought to Phoenix to make an investigation of the fire department and the question of fire protection of this city. This completed the city of Phoenix will be as well protected from fire as any city of its size in the United States and the citizens will be in a position to formally demand a lowering of the present fire insurance rates.

BUSY DRUG STORE LOSS IS FINALLY ADJUSTED

Underwriters Take Over Salvaged Stock and Settle Merchandise Loss.

Announcement was made yesterday that adjustment had been made of the Phoenix Drug company's merchandise loss in the fire which destroyed the busy drug store and other establishments in the Jones building. Assurance has been given by Harry Jones, owner of the former site of the Busy drug store that construction of the new home of this concern will be commenced at once and that it will be ready for occupancy within sixty days. In the meantime the patrons of the Busy drug store will be cared for through the Adams pharmacy where members of the clerical force will be on duty. Orders for photographic development and printing may also be left at the Adams pharmacy for Charles Urban as has been done since the fire.


