COTTON GIN STARTS GRIND AGAIN TODAY

Plant Resumes Steady Run After Half Month Idleness.

After almost a two weeks suspension of work caused by the wet weather the Tempe cotton ginning plant will be placed in operation again this morning. All yesterday the cotton men were busy, the growers picking and hauling and the gin getting the plant in readiness for another steady run which it is hoped will last until the last pound of cotton is picked, ginned and baled for shipment.

In the opinion of the cotton experts of this community the recent rainy season has caused little or no harm to the crops. Beyond the delay in picking and subsequent delays in the other departments of preparing the cotton for the market, little has been lost in comparison to the vast amount of good that will result from the increased bank of water in the reservoir.

The biggest delay has been due to the muddy roads which for almost two weeks made hauling practically out of the question. It was a comparatively easy matter to keep picking other than when it was raining and but for the impassable roads the gin crew would have lost little time.

The shipments from the local plant have kept pace to the output and the 150 bales that went out in a consignment to McFadden Brothers the middle of the week leaves but a small amount of the lint on hand. Nine hundred bales have been shipped so far this season by the Tempe exchange.

MESA SHARES VALLEY'S GENERAL PROSPERITY

Many concerns in Mesa felt in a substantial way the effects of the rising wave of prosperity.
