

THE IMPETUS WAR GIVES TO INDUSTRIES

Example is Shown in Drug Trade by C. L. Beiser, Who Tells of Forced Development of American Chemical Resources

Since the beginning of the European war, the wholesale price of carbolic acid has increased nearly eight hundred per cent. Many drug store customers complain about the increase in price, but were they fully cognizant of the situation, they would realize that not only have the druggists not used the war as an excuse for raising prices, but that it has actually forced sharp increases, and that even at the advanced price, the margin of profit is smaller than formerly.

Speaking of the situation, C. L. Beiser of New York, who was in Phoenix yesterday, said: "I have just received a telegram from my home, 12 E. 84th and Son of New York, instructing me to take no more quantity orders for salicylates, carbolic acid, benzoates, etc. Stocks of these are limited, and future supplies of raw materials in these and other similar lines are not obtainable on account of the various embargo acts. The embargo on potash and borax salts is also having an important effect. Of course, the situation is such as to stimulate development of the natural resources of this country, also the manufacture of various chemicals."

Asked about the reported manufacture of carbolic acid by Thomas Edison, Mr. Beiser said that the article produced by the Edison laboratories was not the carbolic acid of commerce, but was phenol sulphonic, a chemical so similar that it could be substituted for the acid in various manufacturing processes, but not for many other uses.
