### RAINS ARE WELCOMED BY MANY RANCHERS

Precipitation Favorable for Enlarged Acreage Sown to Grain. Will Help Alfalfa

Aside from the temporary inconvenience occasioned by the unprecedented rainy season prevailing the past month, the precipitation is generally welcomed by the ranchers throughout the Mesa section. There is an increased acreage in grain this year occasioned by the present prices being paid for wheat and barley. It has been demonstrated that there is no better method of germinating the seed in the ground and bringing the tiny shoots up through the surface of the soil, than a liberal amount of spring rains. Not only are the rains good for the grain that has recently been planted, but it will be of untold benefit to the alfalfa fields, which are now commencing to show signs of getting ready for the summer crops that will be on within a short time.

In addition to the local benefits there is also the assurance that the deposit in the water bank is growing higher and higher every day, which will mean an abundance of moisture throughout the summer season.

### FINANCES AND MARKETS

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—Renewed selling of stocks at the outset of the session was in such quantities as to bring the average of the prices down to the lowest level of the present movement. Speculative favorites and various specialties declined from one to three points before the buying arrested the downward trend. On recovery trading was dull, and the close irregular. Wall Street's attention was again directed abroad, developments offering little hope of relief from the recent strain. London markets were dull with little demand for Americans. Local conditions were complicated by the recurrent weakness of foreign exchange, and extreme nervousness of cereal markets. Loose Wiles, first, preferred, was the first stock registering a new minimum, declining six points to eight-six. Southern Railway preferred fell almost three points to within a fraction of the established price of forty-five. After closing the exchange announced new minimum prices effective on February 23: American Car and Foundry, forty; Seaboard Air Line, preferred, thirty-eight; American Steel Foundries, twenty-four; Baltimore and Ohio, sixty-five; New Haven, forty-five; Federal Mining preferred, twenty-four; Loose Wiles, second preferred, twenty-four; National Railways of Mexico, first preferred, seventeen; Steel Car, preferred, ninety-four; Seaboard Air Line, preferred, thirty-four.

The bond market was heavy. Total sales, representing a par value of \$1,170,000. United States registered Two's advanced one-eighth on call during the week.
