BIG GOLD STRIKE AT OATMAN DRAWS HUNDREDS DAILY

Find on United Eastern Property Shows High Values—Mohave County Camp Now a City of Tents and a Hive of Industry Says Deputy Mining Inspector

Attracted by news of the big gold strike at the United Eastern property, hundreds of men are pouring into Oatman every day from all parts of the county, according to Deputy State Mining Inspector J. C. Wilson, who was in the city yesterday. Accommodations in and around Oatman are exhausted, and already a city of tents has sprung up around the Mohave gold camp.

"The new strike, which is close to the Tom Reed property, runs high in values," said Inspector Wilson yesterday. "The vein measures from 40 to 45 feet in width, and in places runs from \$25 to \$30 a ton. In other localities the ore averages from ten to twelve dollars. The new vein, while adjoining the Tom Reed, seems to be independent of the other vein."

"Over five hundred men have come into the district since the strike was made, and every day brings many new arrivals," continued Mr. Wilson. "Business in Oatman, Kingman and other towns is booming by reason of the in-rush. While all the claims for a long distance has been staked long ago, there is much activity in bonding and leasing properties, and dealing in options."
