PROSPERITY IN EVIDENCE SAY TAX COMMISSIONERS

Big Demand for Houses at Douglas, Nogales and Tombstone Due to Presence of Troops and Better Mining Conditions

"There is not a house for rent in Douglas or Tombstone," said Chairman Charles R. Howe, of the state tax commission, who has just returned from a trip through the Cochise and Santa Cruz counties. "A large demand for houses exists in Douglas, Tombstone and Tombstone. Certainly business in the Cochise county seat is better than it has been for years.

"At Douglas business is better than ever before. This is due in part of course to the large number of troops quartered there, but the fact remains that the border city has seldom if ever been so prosperous. At Tombstone conditions are much better than they have been for years, and here too, business locations and residences are greatly in demand. The Copper Queen is working between three and four hundred men here and conditions generally are improving rapidly.

"At Douglas the same condition as exists at Nogales obtain, only in a more marked degree," said Chairman Howe. Over 5,000 troops are stationed there, and from the preparations that are being made, it is evidently expected that they will be kept there for some time to come. I went through the camp, which covers two entire sections of land, and was surprised at the substantial type of buildings that are being erected for the accommodation of the soldiers. Among these is a large dance hall and gymnasium, of any kind but a temporary nature, and which is being constructed especially for the use of the troops.

"Commissioner Zander, who went to Yuma and Pima counties, is in Tucson in connection with the commissioner's work with county assessors. He will return to Phoenix this evening.

Miami Young Metropolis of Mining—Graham Farmers Happy—Greenlee Prospering, Says Commissioner Campbell

"Mining men are predicting twenty cent copper inside of six months," said Tax Commissioner Thomas E. Campbell yesterday, after a trip through the eastern part of the state. "In Gila, Graham and Greenlee counties, conditions are excellent in mining, farming and stock raising, and prosperity is already in evidence. At Miami, from eighty to ninety per cent of the full force of men is now at work in the mines, and at the smelter, and everybody is happy over the prospects. Operations at Globe have been almost entirely suspended, on account of the water in the Old Dominion mine, although pumping now seems to be the main industry there, it is being carried on as fast as possible and an early resumption is anticipated.

"In Graham county the prospects for splendid crops are excellent, and farmers are rejoicing over the outlook. The price of wheat is going up, and other grains are also advancing. A large crop of mohair was produced this season, and is bringing very good returns. At Safford there is a young chamber of commerce, only two months old, that is doing splendid work not only for Safford, but for the entire Gila Valley.

"Over in Greenlee county, more men are constantly being put to work at the mines, and smelters. Morenci and Clifton are both in a prosperous condition, and business is improving all the time. In northern Cochise county the dry farmers are jubilant over the rains of the past winter, and the prospects for the growing season."

CABIRIA IS A MIRACLE FILM

D'Annunzio's Great Drama in Film Form Marks the Apex of the Photographer's Art—A Thrilling Story Marvellously Told

To get the utmost enjoyment out of "Cabiria," D'Annunzio's great poetic drama which is now running at the Arizona theater, one should see it in sections. There is so much of it, and it is all so wonderful, that one cannot grasp it all in one visit. From the opening scene in the great Temple of Moloch, with the living children being sacrificed to the fiery god, on through the numberless scenes marking the destruction of the city, the flight of little "Cabiria," her capture and her subsequent escape and adventures, until she is finally restored to her savior Fulvius, this wonderful film drama is a series of pictures which mark the apex of the photographer's art. It stands alone, not only as a spectacle but as a drama of absorbing interest, the filming of which is an achievement not likely to be excelled for some time to come.

There have been many great film spectacles which have achieved world wide fame; but in most of them one sits through countless feet of uninteresting waiting for the punch, the one big scene which gives the production its claim to greatness, and frequently when the punch finally does come on has been too tired to appreciate it. It is quite another thing with "Cabiria." We have heard it extolled for its educational value, for the importance of the historical event it depicts, for the wonder of it as an achievement of photostagecraft and each is justified. It is worth while for a hundred different reasons; but it will appeal to everybody through its dramatic power, as a story of vital interest, portrayed in an extraordinarily graphic and thrilling manner.

In addition to the marvelous stage effects in the destruction of the city by volcanic fire and earthquake, the stupendous interiors that stun one with their immensity, the handling of the crowds in the great mob scenes, and the great fire pictures; there are landscape effects of surpassing beauty. It is hard to imagine anything more supremely lovely than the great snow scenes which show Hannibal crossing the Alps, leading the Carthaginians on the great march to surprise Rome; foot soldiers and cavalry, elephants, sheep, baggage trains and all the impediments of a great army. Nor again those wonderful scenes on the desert of Sahara, with the caravan of camels and men silhouetted against the evening sky, slowly making their way through the billowy sand of the great desert. No such photography has been shown before. The groupings and effects are marvellous—the work of a master mind, a wonderful achievement.

"Cabiria" is beautiful and brutal, it is thrilling and poetic, it repulses and draws, a wonder film that will haunt your memory for many a day. Nothing like it has been seen here before and it will be a long long day before anything to compare with it will come here again.

Italian Steamer Sunk

GENOA, April 5.—A German submarine sunk the Italian steamer Luigi Parodi, which left Baltimore, January 22 with a cargo of coal for Genoa, according to word received here. The report caused a profound impression and there are many expressions of resentment. Great excitement prevails and authorities have taken strong measures to protect the German colony and German ships from reprisals. Nothing is known as to the fate of the crew of the Parodi which was made up entirely of Genoese.

Austria Flags Safe

PETROGRAD, April 5.—A remarkable feature of the surrender of Przemyśl was the fact that not a single Austrian flag was captured. This secret was revealed by Slav prisoners. The night before the surrender, the flags were torn into strips, numbered and given to men for concealment about their persons, the linings of their coats and caps. PRINZ EITEL CAUSES WORK FOR OFFICIALS
