Having been prevented by unsettled weather from holding their picnic at the usual time early in the year, the Indiana folks have chosen a time when Riverside is at its best and "the water's fine" in the big swimming pool, which for the day will take the place in Hoosier hearts of "the ole swimmin' hole," immortalized in the poem by their poet-laureate.

The picnic will be in the afternoon and evening. Children are admitted to the park free and ladies will be admitted free until 4 p. m., after which time the regular admission will be charged. 
