IMPRESSIVE BURIAL OF LUCKLESS "BILL" GERIG

The body of William Gerig, The Republican's chief mail clerk, killed in the motorcycle accident Sunday, was laid to rest yesterday after one of the most impressive ceremonies recently held in Phoenix. One of the largest crowds to attend a funeral in a long time, showed the width of the boy's acquaintance here.

The ceremony was held at the parlors of Moore and McLellan, and Adams street, near the establishment, was blocked by the automobiles and motorcycles of the friends of the dead racer. The crowd was far too large to occupy the chapel, and during the services, scores stood with barred heads upon both sidewalks, awaiting the sad procession to the grave-yard.

At a little before four, the casket was born out by six members of the mailing department of the Republican, associates of Gerig's for the seven years he has been with the paper.

The pall bearers were Wylie Woolley, Otto Bump, Alfred Sanders, Lee Holt, Harry Clark and Elzie McCully.

Ahead of the funeral car, rode most of the members of the Phoenix Motorcycle club, two by two, forming a sorrowful procession and leading "Bill" for the last time. Few enough motorcycles ever rode "Bill" while he was alive and mounted on his bike.

A long line of cars followed the hearse, bearing members of the family, practically every member of The Republican force, and numerous friends.

Expenses of the funeral were donated through the generosity of the motorcycleists, who had so often enjoyed Gerig's work on the track and road. The floral offerings were particularly beautiful.

undertaken for with the Russian retirement in the east, and the continuation of the Balkan negotiations the necessity for achieving something definite in the assault on the Dardanelles is growing greater.

The retreat of the Russians continues and it is probably they will have to fall back further on the Brest-Litovsk line.

Berlin reports that Gen. Litsmann has stormed and taken the forts southwest of the front of Kovno, capturing forty-five hundred prisoners, and two hundred and forty guns. This probably means the early fall of the fortress itself, between which, and the capturing of the Vilna-Warsaw-Petrograd railway, there cannot be much delay.

Another fort northeast of the front of Novogorodsk is also fallen, and a cordon is being closed around the fortress. Other armies from the west and south are advancing toward the Brest-Litovsk line. There is continued activity among the diplomats in the Balkan capitals, and among the Balkan representatives in other capitals. The Serbian minister who is a frequent visitor to the foreign office saw Sir Edward Grey again while another caller was the Roumanian minister. There were no developments however.

The Italians, according to a telegram from Rome, have commenced another general offensive against the Austrians but there is no news of movement from any other of the fronts.

Austrians are Advancing

VIENNA, Aug. 17.—Austro-Hungarian troops pursuing the retreating Russians advanced to Dobrynka, thirteen miles southwest of the fortress of Brest-Litovsk, according to an official statement tonight.

Are Nearing Decision

ROME, Aug. 17.—Reports received by the Italian government from Roumania, Bulgaria, and Greece show military preparations in those countries are being carried on with intense activity. In some quarters here this is taken as an indication that these states are nearing a decision as to their policy of war.
