CAUGHT DISTRIBUTOR OF BULL DOG CIDER

J. E. Troutner After Long Search, Taken Into Custody

J. E. Troutner, who was arrested a couple of months ago at the time of the roundup of various persons engaged in the sale of Bull Dog cider, was taken into custody again yesterday. He had been allowed at that time to go on his own recognizance and he violated the confidence that had been placed in him. It was learned about ten days ago that he had returned to the city but he kept in hiding and his whereabouts could not be discovered until night before last when he was found by Deputy Sheriff Brawner and Constable Morrill at a house in the western part of the city.

The officers found a woman and a couple of children there. They also found two cases of cider, a deputy sheriff full, innumerable empty bottles and a bottle which had contained grain alcohol, the contents of which had probably been used to fortify the cider.

The woman said that she knew nothing about the whereabouts of Troutner but Constable Morrill noticed the toe of a man's shoe protruding from beneath her dress. A hunt in every part of the house failed to reveal anything more. There was a small closet in a corner but it did not seem large enough for a man to hide in. It was fastened or partly fastened in such a way as to leave a crack about three-inches wide. The door could not be opened farther without breaking it and Officer Brawner, who had been watching the door was called away for an instant. When he returned, he noticed that the crack had diminished. He then forced the door and found Troutner wedged into a corner.

He wanted to know what the officer wanted. He was told that his presence was desired. "I can't find my shoes," said Troutner. "I know where they are," replied Brawner, "and I guess you don't. But I can tell you one thing. Where you are going to get up tomorrow morning you will have no trouble finding your shoes. They'll be in plain view."

Troutner said that he had been in Los Angeles on business. He will be arraigned before Justice De Souza today.



EACH MINE COURSE COMPLETE BUT FULL SERIES THE BEST

(Special to The Republican)
TUCSON, Sept. 9.—Among the many inquiries received relative to the short course for miners at the college of mines and engineering of the University of Arizona there seems to be some misunderstanding as to when a man may enter or leave a course.

The sole idea of the course is to give an intensive study of one subject for two weeks; each two weeks course is an individual and separate course, although related to the one given previously and the one following, and each course may be taken separately. Hence a student may enter at the beginning of any one of the 18 courses and stay 2, 4, 6 or any number of weeks.

The courses are given in such a way that a student interested in prospecting should take courses 1 to 5, inclusive whereas one interested in underground work will find courses 8 to 11 inclusive, the most adaptable; for the foreman or shift boss courses 5 to 14 may be studied to advantage, and so on through the list, the courses being grouped so that a man interested in any one subject may study that subject, and those relating to it if he so desires. But it should be distinctly understood that each course is a unit by itself.

Complete information on his work is given in a pamphlet issued by the university, which may be had upon application.
