FINANCES and MARKETS

[Republican A. P. Leased Wire] NEW YORK, Nov. 16. (Wall St.)—Prices in general tended upward today, with some substantial gains in stocks of various descriptions. Distinctive war shares figured only slightly in the rise, but some of the largest advances were scored by stocks of companies which are indirectly profiting by the foreign conflict.

Included in this class were Mercantile Marine preferred, which rose nine points to the record price of 75 3/4, Cuban American sugar, also at a new high price on its rise of 14 to 156, and the coppers, another advance being reported in the price of the metal. The further improvement in marine shares was partly attributed to the belief that an understanding has been reached between the opposing bond and stockholders.

Coppers as a whole constituted the mainstay of the market. New maximums were registered by Anaconda, Utah, Guggenheim Exploration and Chino. American Woolen, U. S. Industrial Alcohol and Oil issues, particularly Texas Company, which rose 1 1/2 to 184, were among the other outstanding stocks.

United States Steel was comparatively obscured by the metal shares and was again under pressure, from which it relaxed slightly in the later dealings. Bethlehem steel was quoted only at rare intervals, but closed at 45 1/2, an advance of 1/4. American Locomotive was strongest of the medium priced war stocks, rising five from 8 1/4 to 13 1/4.

Railways were irregular at the outset, but soon improved on the two point advance in Union Pacific, Canadian Pacific, Southern Pacific, Reading and Lehigh Valley. Atchafalpa, Norfolk and Western and Erie first preferred gained a point or more. An advance of five points in Denver & Rio Grande preferred to 29 was ascribed to the recent strengthening of the Gould control of the property. Total sales amounted to 372,000 shares.

In addition to the 19 cent rate for refined copper, and the placing of more equipment orders for railway and other equipment, further encouragement from the strength of Sterling and Paris Exchange, together with greater monetary ease. Bonds were firm, with a diminution of "future" offerings. Total sales per value aggregated \$5,470,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

CHICAGO GRAIN. CHICAGO, Nov. 16.—Demoralized conditions which the export trade has encountered as a result of the Italian government withdrawal, for military purposes a number of steamships, gave a setback today to the value of wheat. Closing prices, although unsteady, showed a net decline of 1/2 to 1 1/4 @ 1 1/2, with December at 104 1/2 @ 104 1/2, and May at 106 1/2. Corn lost 1/4 to 3/4 @ 1/4, and oats 1/4 to 1/2. Provisions finished at a range varying from 5 cents decline to a rise of 2 1/2c.

Sharp falling off in receipts at Minneapolis had considerable effect in prevailing wheat bears from becoming more aggressive, and so also did the unsteady wheat.

Corn maintained a stubborn front in view of the break in wheat. Oats merely reflected the changes in quotations on corn.

In provisions, buying on the part of packers led to a market completely flat. At first the market had been decidedly weak, owing to much enhanced receipts of hogs.

Tempe News Notes

MANAGER FOR TEMPE OUT OF JOB DEC. 1ST

First Action of Trio of New Aldermen Is to Displace With the Position of Manager.

December 1 will mark the end of a manager's position with the common council of Tempe, according to a vote of that body night before last, and already Manager D. A. Carnes, who has been in the employ of the town since last June, has been notified that his services will not be required after that date.

It was not with the idea that Carnes is not capable of filling his position that the council took such action, it was done purely in the hope of cutting down expenses, and the duties that have heretofore fallen to the manager will hereafter be imposed upon the marshal, who incidentally will receive a slight raise in salary when he resumes his former work.

The looked for resignation of Mayor Frizzell, and of Councilman Devore, did not show up. Both gentlemen, at the meeting of last Thursday night gave notice of their intention to resign, but upon the urgent request of the other aldermen, and of the citizens at large, they have reconsidered.

The motion to displace with the job of manager was carried, three to two, the three new members, Daniels, Alexander and Finch voting aye, and the two older aldermen voting in the negative.

At the suggestion of Dr. Alexander a committee of councilmen has been delegated to investigate the building permit fees and to see if they cannot be reduced. An accountant has also been engaged to audit the clerk's books.

THURSDAY IS TEMPE DAY. Thursday remains, by popular approval, the choice of the business houses as the day for closing and for a visit to the fair, and it is expected that all of the dry goods yards, the hardware, the lumber and the other establishments will be closed tomorrow for the entire day.

Because today is Saturday the year, it was thought there might be some objection to a general closing on Thursday, but on the other hand the suggestion met with instant approval and the petition circulated bears the name of practically all of the business firms of the town.
