

TO DIRECT RESOURCES AGAINST THOSE RESPONSIBLE FOR ACTS AGAINST AMERICAN PLANTS

Leased Wire] WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Official notice of the United States government's intention to employ all its resources in running down and punishing those responsible for factory explosions, intimidation of labor and other acts of violence against American industries, is couched in a statement issued tonight by Attorney General Gregory with an appeal to state authorities to be equally vigorous in dealing with lawlessness beyond the reach of federal statutes.

AERO-SQUADRON READY TO FLY

Leased Wire] FORT WORTH, Texas, Nov. 21.—The first aerodivision of the United States army, consisting of six military tractors, will resume its cross-country flight of 500 miles from Fort Sill, Oklahoma, to San Antonio, Tex., at 8 o'clock on Monday morning. Waco, 90 miles air-line from here, will be the next landing place.

Monday the aviators will spend in Waco. Tuesday they will take the next leg of the trip, landing in Austin, and on Wednesday they expect to complete the first cross-country flight of its kind ever undertaken by United States army fliers when they land on the aviation field of their permanent headquarters at Fort Sam Houston.

More than 50,000 persons inspected the squadron here today.

WEATHER TODAY

[Republican A. P. Leased Wire] WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 21.—For Arizona: Monday and Tuesday fair; not much change in temperature.

Many crimes of violence, however, such as arson, malicious destruction of property, etc., can in general be punished in the federal courts only when the United States has special jurisdiction. It follows, therefore, that such attempts to injure and destroy American industries must usually be prosecuted by state authorities.

These conditions, so destructive to the commerce and labor of the United States, require vigorous action on the part of all agencies of the state and federal governments. It is therefore, to be earnestly hoped that state officials will be equally active.

I have instructed the agents of the department of justice, whenever they discover evidences of violations of state criminal laws, to place the seal of the state at the disposal of the local state officials; and I assume that such officials will cooperate in acquainting the federal officials with all information tending to show the commission of federal crimes.

There have been various official intimations during the past few days of the government's purpose to be more than ever active in seeking out offenders against the neutrality and criminal laws of the United States by agents or sympathizers of European belligerents. DR. SHAW NOT CANDIDATE TO SUCCEED HERSELF IN OFFICE

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, who has been president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association for eleven years, will not be a candidate to succeed herself at the coming annual convention, to be held in Washington on December 14 to 18, it was announced here tonight. Dr. Shaw, who has been an active worker for the cause of equal suffrage for thirty years, made the announcement in an open letter sent to the members of the national board and to the presidents of the state associations, affiliated with the national association.

"During the past year," read Dr. Shaw's letter, "I have been increasingly conscious of the growing response to the spoken word on behalf of this cause of ours. Because of the unparalleled large audiences drawn to our standard everywhere, I have become convinced that my highest service to the suffrage movement can be given best if I am relieved of the exacting duties of the presidency so that I may be free to engage in campaign work since each year brings its quota of campaign stress."

PART OF SERB ARMY RETREATS INTO MONTENEGRO, ON THE LIM

PARIS, Nov. 21.—An official statement received at the Montenegrin consulate indicates that part of the Serbian army has retreated into Montenegro, joining with Montenegrin troops on the Lim river. The statement says these troops were attacked heavily along the river on Friday. It follows:

"Our troops with Serbians sustained heavy assaults on the river Lim on Friday. Our army in the Sank of Novipazar was obliged to retire on the principal positions of defense.

"On the other fronts artillery engagements continued. Several infantry attacks were repulsed."

The following official communication was issued tonight:

"The artillery actions have been very spirited in Artois around Loos and Hutoch, as well as to the north of the Somme and to the north of the Aisne, in the region of Armancourt, Dancourt and Thilloy, and also near Soissons. The enemy works were very badly damaged by our fire.

"In the Argonne, at Boland, we exploded successfully two series of mines. A very violent cannonade has taken place at Vaquois.

"On the heights of the Meuse, in the Bois Des Chevalliers, the explosion of a German mine caused no damage in our lines."

The Belgium official communications reads:

"Our advance posts and our positions in the neighborhood of Dixmunde were bombarded. Our artillery has counter-shelled the German batteries and trenches and dispersed groups of military pioneers at diverse points along the front. In reply to the bombardment of Furnes our aviators bombarded the enemy cantonnments at Nessen.

"Army of east: Quiet has prevailed on the French front since the Bulgarian counter attacks on our positions in the direction of Kovrin. All the attacks were repulsed with appreciable losses to the enemy.

"The landing of French and British troops at Saloniki continues without incident."

BERLIN, Nov. 21, via London.—The Tageblatt's correspondent at Austrian press headquarters in Serbia wires that the number of Serbians taken prisoners has reached 80,000 and that more than 500 guns have been captured. Notwithstanding their severe losses, he says, the Serbians are fighting bravely.

Serbian Victory

ROME, (Via London) Nov. 22.—The Serbian legation here reports an important Serbian victory at Leskovats,

tacks against the San Martino sector and north of the Gorizia bridgehead met the same fate.

"On the summit of the Col Di Lana, the defenders repelled two Italian attacks against road barricades near Siagora.

"Southeastern theater: Despite the resistance of the strongly entrenched Montenegrins, the Austro-Hungarian army forced a passage across the upper Drina north of Cajnik.

"German troops have occupied Novipazar. East of Novipazar an Austro-Hungarian column repulsed the enemy in the Ibar valley. The number of persons captured yesterday, exceeds 2000.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 21.—Via London.—The statement issued by the war office today says:

"On the western front the situation is unchanged.

"In the Caucasus, in the region of Tortum and the coast there was artillery and rifle firing and skirmishing between advanced guards.

"North of Lake Van and south of Lake Urumiah, there have been engagements with bands of Kurds."

TAKE LAST TEN BODIES FROM MINE

SEATTLE, Nov. 21.—The last ten bodies of the victims of last Tuesday's explosion in the Northwestern Improvement company's coal mine at Ravensdale were recovered late today. The total number of bodies recovered was 31, which correspond with the number of dead announced by the company after the explosion.

POPULATION HOMELESS

QUEBEC, Nov. 21.—One child was buried to death and nearly all of the 400 inhabitants of St. George Beauce, near here, were made homeless by a fire which swept that village today. Seventy buildings, including five hotels, were destroyed. The property loss is estimated at \$200,000.

BEACH AMUSEMENT MAN PROBABLY TOOK OWN LIFE

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21.—Letters demanding the immediate payment of a \$16,000 mortgage on his residence were found today in the correspondence left by W. J. Guthrie, formerly of Butte, Montana, whose sudden death on Saturday at Palms, near here, was found at an autopsy to have been due to a powerful, quick-acting poison.

This fact, accompanied by the further discovery by J. D. Hunter, chief of district attorney's staff of investigators, and Joseph Margolis, city detective, that Guthrie carried life insurance to a total amount of about \$60,000 prompted them to express themselves as convinced that Guthrie had committed suicide.

These facts were learned subsequently to the information which they claimed to have obtained that Guthrie had suffered financial reverses and was heavily in debt as the result of unsuccessful ventures in amusement enterprises at a beach resort near the city.

The result of the investigation was communicated to Clairs Woolwine, deputy district attorney, and also to Calvin Hurtwell, owner of Los Angeles county. The latter said that from what he had learned of the case there was nothing to convince him that an inquest was necessary, as in his opinion the case was one of suicide.
